LINDBERGH TO RECEIVE PRIZE MONEY TODAY

Ace And Famous "Spirit Of St. Louis" Were Reunited This Morning—New York Reception To Be Climaxed With Presentation Of \$25,000.

NEW YORK, June 16. — The famous Colonel Charles Lindbergh and the Ryan monoplane, "Spirit of St. Louis" were reunited today while New York and Washington slept. Leaving the Curtiss Field in New York at 2:45 a. m., Lindbergh flew to Washington in an army plane. He landed at 4:37, and left in the "Spirit of St. Louis" at eight minutes after five and returned to Mitchell Field in New York, where he landed, at 7:54.

He returned to New York in plenty of time to begin the last day there with a busy program of six engagements.

PLAN ROGUE RIVER SURVEY

Conservation Of Fish And Study Of Propagation To Be Made

Conservation of the Rogue River as a sportsmen and commercial stream is to be undertaken by the state Fish and Game Commission. A survey of the stream, which will include a study of the question of propagation of fish best adapted to the stream, and protection from loss through irrigation ditches and power turbines and from pollution is to be made.
