SCHOOL LAWN TO BE SEEDED

Some minor improvements were discussed and the local official was authorized to extend the seeding of the school lawn. The question of possibly moving the gymnasium building from the old normal school grounds to the athletic grounds near the new normal school was discussed. Mr. Churchill said it had not been decided whether this would be done. The idea would be to use this not as a gymnasium, as it would be too small for that, but to use it for showers and a rubbing down room for the normal school athletes. The cost of moving it might make the move inadvisable, however.

Coddling Moth Spray Time Here

Orchardists are advised by County Agent Inskeep of Clackamas, to apply the first coddling moth cover spray as soon as possible now, as the adult moths have been flying about for several days. Powdered lead arsenate is the standard control material. The usual dilution is two pounds to 100 gallons of spray solution. In those regions where wormy apples are particularly difficult to prevent, the lead arsenate should be increased to three or four pounds to the 100 gallons.
