

### Summer White House In Black Hills Adjoins Million-Acre National Forest

The "Summer White House" in the Custer State Park in the Black Hills of South Dakota, where President Coolidge will spend the summer months, adjoins the Black Hills National Forest and the Harney National Forest, which are not only rich in Indian lore and pioneer historic interest but furnish one of the earliest examples of forest management in the United States. The President will therefore have the opportunity both of enjoying the hospitality of the State of South Dakota and of making himself at home on a million-acre Federal forest estate.

The State park of 60,000 acres, where the Summer White House is located, is adjacent to the Harney National Forest and a few miles south of the Black Hills National Forest. This park was the southeast corner of the Harney National Forest until the Federal Government exchanged it, as a solid block, for State

lands scattered throughout the Federal holdings. The two forests, set aside by President Cleveland in 1897, have a net area of 1,135,167 acres of Government land, 59,000 acres of which are in the Theodore Roosevelt Game Preserve and 50,000 acres in a Federal game refuge adjoining the State park. Within the present boundaries of the forests there are also 249,457 acres of patented lands, some of them in prosperous farms and ranches on the stream bottoms, some timberland more or less abused by hard cutting and fire, and some mining claims.

The name "Black Hills" was given to the region by the Sioux Indians. In their tongue, it was "Paha Sapa," in allusion to the somber appearance of the forest clad heights as seen from the plains. The Harney Forest was named for General Harney who was one of the early explorers of the region.

### BOYS' CAMP SAFE PLACE

Life Guard For Swimmers, Health Cards And No Traffic, Says Walters

With six boys already signed up for the annual Y. M. C. A. camp and quite a number of others asking for reservations, everything points to a good camp this year, according to those in charge. "A number of parents ask us about the safety of such a camp, and this is a natural question," stated Secretary W. P. Walters. "A boy is just as safe in camp as he is in the city, in fact he is a bit safer as there are no autos to be dodging. Our swimming is well supervised, no boy being allowed to go in swimming until the life guards are in, and then only at the regular swimming periods. Boys are not permitted to leave camp without permission and then not alone." It was further explained. Another safety feature of the camp is the filling out of a daily health card, giving the camp director information regarding a the health condition of every boy in camp at the close of each day. This is done to prevent any serious sickness or infections. It was explained. The Y. M. C. A. camp will be held at the Lake of the Woods this year and is open to any boy 12 years of age or over. Many attractive features are offered to those who attend, including archery, a rifle range, First Aid, Nature study, baseball, boating, hiking, swimming, Bible study, stunt night, kangaroo court and many other features dear to the heart of a boy, according to those promoting the camp. Registration for the camp is open now and will close on July 5th.

### FORESTRY IS PROFESSION

Recognition Of Work In This Line Is Made By Colleges

Although forestry has gained recognition as a profession only within the last thirty years today there are more than 1,500 young men in the United States studying for foresters' careers, and forestry is a recognized profession charged with the solution of what is perhaps the country's greatest economic problem, that of putting to the best use 470,000,000 acres of forest land.

The requirements, opportunities and ideals of the forester's profession have been set forth by Edward A. Sherman, Associate Forester of the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture, in a new government bulletin just issued, called "Forestry as a Profession."

### "PUSSYFOOT" DEFENDS PROHIBITION AMENDMENT

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21. —

The remark that prohibition has made the United States the laughing stock of the world originated with a "certain type" of Americans and is not a true statement, William E. "Pussyfoot" Johnson, internationally known prohibition lecturer, told a Los Angeles audience.

"One proof that the eighteenth amendment is not a failure is the comparison in the number of arrests for drunkenness in America and foreign cities," Johnson said. "London last year had three and one half the number of arrests made in New York. There were two arrests in Paris and ten in Stockholm to every one in New York, known as America's wickedest city."

school of forestry, according to Mr. Sherman. Since that time 23 institutions have included courses leading to a degree in forestry and 50 others now include forestry in their curricula. Here on the Pacific Coast forestry is taught at the University of Washington, Oregon State College, Washington State College, University of British Columbia, and the University of California.

The competent forester must be physically capable of a rigorous life in the woods, says Mr. Sherman, as spending a considerable portion of one's time in the woods, with few comforts and frequent hardships, as a part of one's regular business is quite different from camping out for a few weeks on a vacation. Many are attracted to the profession because of its possibilities of outdoor life without realizing the strenuous nature of the field work. The nature of the forester's work, the bulletin states, moreover calls for technical training as well as business and executive ability. The forester is called upon to administer timberlands, devising methods and practice of fire protection, the best methods of lumbering, and dealing with the problem of utilization of the forest without impairing its permanency in timber production: He must know how to appraise timber and utilize it as well as how to grow it, and he must be able to manage and develop the property in his care so as to make it yield increasingly heavy returns at lower cost.

### TRAIN "HELLO" GIRLS TO TALK

Special Emphasis Is Placed On Articulation And Enunciation

Efforts are being constantly made according to Miss Myrta E. Otterdale, Manager of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company to improve and maintain at a high standard the articulation and enunciation of the telephone operators of the company.

Called as the state's star witness against Miss Mackaye, charged with attempting to conceal the manner of her husband's death, "Jungle's" story varied not at all from that he told during the Kelly trial.

Several times he said he had served the morning meal to Kelly and the emotional actress in Kelly's apartment. Usually, he said, such occurrences followed all-night drinking parties in which Helen Wilkinson, chum of Miss Mackaye, and Max Wagner, Kelly's room-mate, rounded out a foursome.
