C. C. TALKS RECREATION

Congressional Delegation Will Be In Valley Friday

Louis Dodge, representing the Golf club Tuesday noon gave the Chamber of Commerce members special invitation to participate in the opening ceremonies tomorrow, explaining the program and other details of the affair, at the forum luncheon.

Good attendance marked the meeting. Fred Peterson, superintendent of schools in Klamath county in a brief speech explained the county unit system, which is to be passed upon at the election June 28.

Secretary J. H. Fuller, told members that Senator G. L. McNary and Congressman W. C. Hawley will be in the valley Friday to look over irrigation projects, and may be accompanied by other members of the congressional delegation. Mr. Fuller goes to Medford this evening to arrange with other valley representatives for the program for the visit of these men.

Fuller also urged members of the Chamber of Commerce to remember the visiting delegation of Virginians who will be in Ashland July 3. Some arrangements are to be made for the delegation to have dinner in this city.

Ford folks might rightly be antagonized if the unit system were forced on them through voters of Medford and Ashland.

The resolution was as follows: "The Board of Directors of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce feels that the County Unit measure which appears on the ballot of the special election June 28th is a matter which should be decided by the people residing in the districts outside of Medford and Ashland because it affects their territory only. Because of this we recommend that the people of Ashland do not vote on this measure."

Furthermore, that a copy of this resolution be given to the local papers and that another copy be sent to the Medford Chamber of Commerce with the suggestion that their Board consider similar action. Our Board wishes it understood that we are not taking sides for or against the County

Unit proposition—we simply want to play fair with our neighbors and let them decide their own issues.
