Byrd Has Enviably Records As Scientist, Sportsman, Aviator

Commander Richard E. Byrd, whose projected flight to Europe is attracting the attention of those interested in aeronautics, is a scientist, a sportsman, an aviator, an American gentleman, whose history in the development of aviation is outstanding.

Byrd seems to have been born an adventurer. At the age of 12 he begged so insistently that he gained his mother's consent to his making a round-the-world journey by himself. He set out from Richmond Va., crossed the continent to San Francisco, caught a steamer for the Philippines and covered the ports of the Orient in various coasting vessels. When finally, after a tour of Europe, he landed in New York, he was interviewed by reporters and the story of the youngest unescorted globe trotter in the world was widely published.

By the time he was 15 he had set as his goal the discovery of the North Pole, and it was while he was fitting himself for that adventure at the Naval Academy that the news of Peary's achievement robbed him of his hope of being first at the top of the world.

Undismayed, the young man clung to his ambition to explore the Arctic. After completing the routine courses of the Navy, Byrd's interest in aviation caused

him to transfer to the air service of the navy and he devoted his scientific knowledge to the study of air navigation. His invention of the "bubble sextant," which enables the flier to obtain an artificial horizon and calculate his position, together with that of a sun compass and a drift indicator, have been important aids to long distance flying. In recognition of his unusual ability, he was assigned in 1919 to the duty of developing methods and instruments of air navigation.

When finally in May, 1926, he realized his boyish ambition and flew safely over the Pole, he reaped the reward of thorough and consistent training in preparation for just that particular accomplishment.

Now he faces the trans-Atlantic flight, backed by all his accumulated fund of technical knowledge and further strengthened by experience and the habit of success. It is no disparagement to Lindbergh to say that in spite of his amazing skill as an aviator, he knowingly "took a chance" in his lonely flight. It was the glorious deed of a youthful hero. The flight of Byrd is the well-considered effort of a mature scientist who has long since proved his courage, but who nevertheless takes no chance that prudence and foresight can avoid.
