Harold J. Stonier Now Leads Advertising Club

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23. (UP)—Pacific Coast advertising men closed their four-day convention Wednesday afternoon with the selection of Honolulu for the 1928 convention city.

Today's session was by far the busiest, from a business angle, of the four days of general assemblies. Election of officers was completed in the afternoon, and at the same time, a new constitution, which eliminates the word "Coast" from the name of the organization—it now embracing the Hawaiian islands—was adopted.

Harold J. Stonier, vice president of the University of Southern California and president of the Advertising Club of Los Angeles, is the new president of the organization. He takes over the office formerly held by Marshall N. Dana, associate editor of the Portland "Oregon Journal."
