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The Mystery

What is the mystery? Yesterday morning the officials steadfastly refused to make available to the newspaper men the confession which the D'Autremont boys had made to the officials relative to the tunnel dynamiting, which resulted in their sentence to life terms in the penitentiary.

Yet, they freely gave permission to the newspaper men to interview the D'Autremonts, who equally as freely told the gruesome story of how they had dynamited the mail car, which resulted in the death of the postal clerk, and how they had shot down in cold blood three trainmen who interfered or resisted them.

This confession, by interview, which The Daily Tidings printed yesterday as did other daily newspapers, purported to give the lurid details of the crime. [And in practically every instance, the details of the interview confession coincided with the circumstantial evidence as interviewed in the trial of Hugh D'Autremont.

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Asking for mercy before the Tidings representative had hardly completed writing down their statement that, seeing Coyle Johnson come around the side of the engine, they had heartlessly shot him down without giving him a chance to protect himself, while he was merely going to see what the trouble was and to offer aid to his fellow trainmen if they needed aid.

Asking for mercy when The Tidings reporter's blood had hardly cooled after the recital by one of the D'Autremonts wherein Engineer Bates, who had loyally set his engine for a full stop and refused to change it, even with death threatening him in the face, had been killed with a dastardly bullet.

Asking for consideration when the writer still visioned the chaos which must have existed which prompted the three cowards to decide that they did not want to stay and face an attack which might have made them really fight and in their hurried flight, take a beastly advantage of the only surviving member of the crew which had been held up by shooting Fireman Seng.

And in this moment the writer remembered the thunderous appeals of U. S. District Attorney George Neuner who in his appeal for a death sentence for Hugh had so truthfully visioned and deduced the situation as the murderers had just been outlining to the writer.

A fair deal. Could there be a fair deal for a trio of depraved, deluded beast-
