HOLLWOOD, Cal., June 25 .-(P) - Hollywood, the world's greatest rumor center, was exceeding its own usual output Friday night.

Speculation hinged on whether the high-priced stars of the fflm cofony were going to accept salary cuts of from 10 to 25 per cent; announced by the Motion Picture Producers' association.

In many cases, it was predicted, stars would not be asked to submit to the general sighing of incomes. Open rebellion is expected from a great many of the film celebrities, humble submission from others.

Late Friday night only one company had officially asked its players to join in the revision of salaries. Warner Brothers issued a statement saying all employes 25 per cent less pay in the new step to "stabilize the motion picture industry."

GRADUATION PERCENT HIGH

Mrs. Sysanne Homes Carter Gives Figures On Eighth Grade Work

The graduating classes for the eighth grade of the county schools showed some gain in standards this year according to County Superintendent Susanne Homes Carter. There were 218 pupils listed for graduation. From town schools, not including Ashland and Medford, 104 wrote examinations and 84 received diplomas. This was 81 per cent of the total. Seven per cent failed and 12 per cent were conditioned.

From the rural one, two and three-teacher schools, 114 wrote examinations, 87 received diplomas, or 76 per cent, while 13 per cent failed and 11 per cent were conditioned.

"We should graduate a higher per centage of eighth grade sible through a standardization of the work," Mrs. Carter says.
