MAY REACH AGREEMENT

Few Divergencies In Naval Disarmament Conference

GENEVA, June 25.—(AP)—The United States and Great Britain Friday moved toward an agreement on naval disarmament.

Both W. C. Bridgeman, head of the British delegation to the three-power conference, and Hugh S. Gibson, directing American efforts for disarmament, announced that private discussions had brought the two delegations nearer accord. Bridgeman said only two serious divergencies of opinion exist, these hinging on the two British propositions:

First, to limit the size of all categories of ships and, second, to extend the life of capital ships. That strong sentiment for the United States to build to the limit of the ratio permitted by the conference exists within the American delegation was shown in a statement by Admiral Hilary P. Jones, prominent member of the American group.
