 While the Japanese delegation refused to admit it had received new instructions from Tokyo, competent persons in touch with the conference work maintained the instructions had arrived. By these new orders from the Japanese government, Viscount Ishii, head of the Japanese delegation, has been given full authority to discuss the British proposals for decreasing battle ship tonnage and extending the life of such ships, it was said.

Hugh S. Gibson, American delegation chief, virtually stated Monday the United States would not discuss capital ships unless France and Italy, signatories of the Washington conference treaty, which was thought to have settled that question, were called into conference.
 Thus the possibility that Great Britain and Japan might make the American position increasingly difficult was being given widespread consideration.
