### BETTER GET "LIGHTED UP"

#### Traffic Officer Talent Declared War On Light Violators

Traffic Officer C. P. Talent has declared war on "one-eyed" drivers, and drivers who operate their motor cars with no tail light. "We have talked for the last three months. Last night I issued 24 warnings to drivers operating with improper lights, now we are giving everyone fair warning and within the next two or three days we will conduct a 'light raid' and every operator of a motor vehicle who does not have a tail light burning and two headlights on his automobile will be ordered into court," Talent said today. The "one-eyed" driver is one of the most dangerous motorists on the road, as it is always a problem which light of the car is burning. "Time after time, we hear the same excuse, 'the light just went out' and because we have been lenient and let these offenders go with warnings, we do not seem to be able to curb these offenders. We are giving warning now. Then we will act, and regardless of how long the tail lights or head lights may have been out of commission, we will listen to no excuses and give no warnings, but will give orders to every violator to appear in court and 'tell it to the judge.' We must have the desired effect of getting proper lighting on automobiles," according to the officer.

Night driving becomes most dangerous when motorists, trusting to the good nature and leniency of traffic officers fail to keep head lights and tail lights on their automobiles burning. Traffic officers have been busy for weeks practically every night, warning these offenders but warnings have failed to get the desired response and now action will be taken. "No excuses, straight to court they go, and no recommendation for leniency," says Officer Talent in warning folks to get properly "lighted up."
