

With a decisive "No" Jackson county voters Tuesday defeated the measure to uitize rural schools of the county foot drift to find "bottom" and by a vote of almost seven to one.

Voters in Ashland precincts, according to inofficial totals defeated the measure more than two to one, 112 votes in favor of the measure compared to 276 against. In rural districts the vote against the measure was

Voters of Ashland disapproved the mill levy by 159 votes in favor to 291 against.
