Traffic Cop Leads Busy Life Report Of Activities Discloses

raffic cop job is a soft position, and wonder just what the traffic ficer does with his "spare time", but a survey or the work done by lot of territory. city has brought suit against C. P. Talent, local state traffic offeer during the month of May shows that little time is spent in resting.

During the 28 days he spent on duty he covered 2,991 miles on his motorcycle, issued 267 warnings to traffic violators and made 11 arrests.

Like the duty of a doctor or are chief, or any other executive, much attention is paid by traffic officers to issuing warnings to violators in the hope of preventing ecidents and arrests. The most common violators of

traffic regulations are drivers of foreign cars, according to the report which shows that 71 of the 267 warnings made were given to drivers of foreign cars who were directed to register their

Light violations are second on the list, with 34 motorists warned not to operate without tail lights burning, six with improper spotlights, 25 driving with only one headlight burning, 13 with illegally adjusted lights, while four motories were warned not Plane Will Be to continue to operate their cars without headlights.

Twenty-seven speeders were warned by Officer Talent during May to avoid "stepping on the gas" so much. Officer Talent says that speeding at the present time improper lights.

· Seventeen were warned not to operate without operator's license in their possession and 10 were found operating cars without proper license plates.

Other warnings given included nine for parking, on mirrors, passing on curves, no license plates, void 1926 license plates in use, switched licenses, reckless driving, driving while intoxicated, etc. In four cases assistance was rendered to motorists in trouble by the traffic officer.

Lieutenant Olin O. Nichols, who also directs traffic in Jackson county covered 3,609 miles during May, during the 28 days in the field, issued 104 warnings and made nine arrests.

State traffic officers during May made a total of 255 arrests the report discloses, the greatest numbeing that of speeding, 69 arrests being made on this charge. Accidents outside of Portland,

reported by the traffic officers for the month totalled 243 with 63 persons injured and seven killed. Sixty-eight of the accidents were reported to have been the result of carlessness, while 33 were said to be directly responsible to speeding.
