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INTENSE HEAT SWEEPS EAST

Twenty Nine Deaths Indirect Result of Intense Heat

CHICAGO, June 30.—(UP)—Death dealing heat prostrated the central west today, bringing a score of casualties. There is little hope of relief until tomorrow when temperatures will moderate somewhat.

Every available body of water was crowded with bathers seeking relief from the sun. The weather bureau announced the temperature would reach 98 here today. Ohio reported nine deaths due to the heat wave and numerous prostrations.

Five died in Chicago yesterday and one today. Two died in Wisconsin of the intense heat and two died in bathing.

Three deaths were reported in Minnesota. Seven persons were drowned in bathing and boat accidents in Iowa.

TWO DIE IN EUGENE FIRE

Father and Son Perish in Sudden Blaze — Explosion Starts Conflagration

EUGENE, Ore., June 30.—Oscar Johnson, 27, and Lester Cooper, 7, are dead and Mrs. Johnson is in a local hospital suffering from painful burns as the result of a fire which burned their home near McCoy mill Wednesday.

Cause of the fire was said to have been an explosion of a kerosene can from which Johnson was pouring oil on a fire in an attempt to make it burn brighter.

The explosion killed Cooper instantly, and Johnson died at the Eugene hospital yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Johnson will recover, it was said.
