Oakland Plane May Fly Yet

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—(UP)—The monoplane "City of Oakland," may re-start its projected flight to Honolulu this week, but Captain Charles Carter will not navigate it.

Carter objected to an immediate resumption of the flight yesterday after a broken windshield had forced the plane to return to Oakland Airport shortly after taking off. His objection revealed that dissension had arisen between him, Ernest L. Smith, pilot, and Edmund J. Moffett, principal backer.

After a conference with Moffett today Carter announced: "I am not interested any more in the trans-Pacific flight. I wanted to go first or not at all. I won't stop anyone else who cares to go."
