#### Cooked Cream Dressing

- 1/2 cup Mazola
- 3 tablespoons Kero, Red or Blue Label
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne
- 4 tablespoons Argo or Klappford's Cornstarch
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 1/2 cups top milk

### London Woman Penetrates Wilds of Northern Siberia

LENINGRAD. —(AP)—Natalia Kotchikova has come back, after a solitary four-months scientific expedition in the ice-fields of Siberia. She went alone to visit Samoyeds and other primitive tribes of the frozen North to study the life of the natives. She is a student in the Leningrad Academy of Science.

She set out with a scientific expedition headed by a woman savant, Dr. Rosa Mitunova of the Leningrad Academy. Four scientists constituted Mrs. Mitunova's party, which stayed five months in the Arctic regions. The girl student, Miss Kotchikova, left the others after a month and departed by herself, riding a reindeer into the unmapped and unexplored territory of northernmost Siberia, where she learned the language of the native people.

Even in the ice fields, dodging the income taxes is a popular pastime, the party reported. The natives gladly answered all their questions but when the inquiries turned to the size of their reindeer herds, they became secretive, evidently fearing that their taxes would be increased if the number of their animals were known.

These were the people who as-tounded the Soviet authorities several months ago by raising a clamor of protest because the government had decided to exempt them from all taxation. Epidemics had swept the reindeer herds and impoverished the people of the ice fields, and the government wanted to help them by relieving them of all taxes. But the people sent an indignant delegation to Moscow to protest against the discrimination, on the ground that if they did not pay taxes, the Soviet Government might be inclined to overlook their rights as citizens.

RECOVER BODY—(AP) OSSINING, N. Y., July 7.—(AP)—While the body of one of the victims of the triple drowning off Sing Sing was being identified Wednesday, the warden of the penitentiary was issuing orders which may prevent a repetition of the affair.

"Hereafter, in any sort of an emergency, the warden's office must be notified at once," Warden Lewis E. Lawes, insisted. Obedience to order prevented the guards from permitting an attempt at rescue.
