EL CENTRO, Cal., July 7.

(UP)—Employing a small negro boy to load watermelons and forbidding him to eat any is more than a violation of the child labor law

—it is cruel and inhuman treatment, it was decided here Wednesday.

Sam Osoff, Greek produce man, charged with hiring the negro land at 10 cents a day, was fined \$250 by Pa-

lice Judge Perkins. In passing sentence, Judge Perkins declared that in view of the youth's race, such treatment was "cruel and inhuman."
