SAY CRIPPLE DANCES WELL

Woman Used Crutch in Court But Kicks at Chandelier, Say Witnesses

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—(UP)—Although Mrs. Myrtle Hixon asserts that she is almost a cripple because of a crushed foot sustained when a street car was shut on her foot, January 29, 1927, and asks \$40,000 damages from the Portland Electric Power Co., witnesses for the power company today testified in circuit court that she is far from a cripple.

Several testified that she danced—and danced well—particularly the Charleston, at a roadhouse near here July 11, 1927. One witness went so far as to say that Mrs. Hixon made three unsuccessful, but skillful attempts to kick a chandelier that same night. Mrs. Hixon walked with crutches and wore no shoe on the alleged injured foot when she appeared in court Tuesday.

Nugget Gold Is Sailor's Prize

CAPE MAY, N. J., July 20.—(UP)—A 28-pound lump of ambergris—"nugget gold of the sea"—was found about 15 miles off shore here by Jeremiah Pratt, 74 year old seaman of the fishing schooner Mary Ann of Gloucester, Mass.

The old seaman said he had been offered \$448 a pound, or about \$12,500 for the foul-smelling mass by a New York perfumer, and intended to use the money to retire and buy a chicken farm.

Pratt was on lookout when his attention was attracted by sea gulls hovering over the mass.

Ambergris, a rare substance thrown off by some sperm whales, has been used since ancient time in perfume manufacture.

CAL MEETS H. HOOVER

Secretary of Commerce Indicates He Favors Extra Session of Congress

CUSTER, S. D., July 20.—(UP)—Secretary of Commerce Herbert H. Hoover was met at the railroad here this morning by President Coolidge who discussed with him the advisability of calling a special session of Congress in October for Mississippi flood relief work. While Hoover declined to discuss the subject he indicated he favored the extra session.

Pigeon Racing Is Popular Sport In England—4,000 Birds In Race

LONDON.—(UP)—Pigeon flying as a sport is almost exclusively confined to the working classes. Therefore it would seem to be inexpensive. Yet statistics indicate that many thousands are spent and lost in pursuit of this hobby.

The birds themselves, their upkeep and transportation is comparatively small, well within the finances of the pigeon-flyer, but it is bad weather and similar uncontrollable circumstances which do the damage.

Nearly 4,000 birds were sent out on a recent race from Haines to England. The birds were released on a Saturday, but encountered a terrific storm in the

English Channel, and up to a week later fewer than 25 per cent had returned. Of 600 pigeons in another race on the same day only 50 returned.

Most of the birds were the property of ironworkers and miners who have suffered heavily through this loss, for the total value of the birds is said to have been \$50,000.

One fancier had two back out of 20; another, one out of 18. A novice had good luck as his only four entrants returned the same night. Two birds which managed to brave the storm fell on the coast and were too weak to rise again. One pigeon alighted on a German steamer in the Channel and was returned by the captain.

FOREST FIRE TOLL GREAT

GUSTINE, Calif., July 20.—(UP)—The toll reaped by forest fires cannot be counted solely in terms of acreage burned over, said Game Warden William Gourley in pointing out that thousands of game birds and animals die in the flames.

Referring to a two-day grass fire of the past week he estimated that between 5,000 and 6,000 young quail were burned to death.

BEN LINDSEY IN PORTLAND

Defends "Compassionate Marriage" in Interview—Will Lick Enemies

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—Former Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver delivered himself of a few Philippines assailing the gang of politicians who unseated him from office in Denver and the critics of his plan of "compassionate marriage" all over the country, while he stopped here a few hours Tuesday on his way to Los Angeles.

"I'm going back to Denver and I'm going to lick them," he said, of his political adversaries, whom he blames for the action of the supreme court in declaring his last election illegal.

He denied that he advocates free love and asserts that his "compassionate marriage" plan will do away with free love.

"Compassionate marriage" is a contract between men and women who are not yet able to pay the expenses of child birth, those who do not want children, or those who are too old for children," he said.

Water Power For 300 Years

The oldest water power site in America, over three hundred years old, is situated on the Piscataqua River at South Berwick, Maine. It was established, on the site of the present Burleigh blanket mills, in 1620 by one Ferdinand Gorges, who had obtained a grant from the English crown giving him the right to settle and develop the territory from sea to sea lying between the 40th and 48th parallels north latitude.

The grant, however, required him to develop water power and accordingly he constructed a log dam, erected a grist mill and sent the meal to England as proof that the terms of the charter were being lived up to. The water power site has been in continuous use ever since.

INFINITE NO LONGER MYTH

Universe Not Boundless and Einstein Was Correct, Says Authority

PASADENA, Cal., July 20.—(UP)—The so-called infinite universe is not boundless, as has been supposed, but has definite boundaries, according to Dr. Edwin Hubble, a leading authority on nebular subjects, of the Mt. Wilson observatory.

In an address before the University club last night, Dr. Hubble declared that he had established definite boundaries based on the Einstein theory of relativity.

"Through the use of the 100 inch reflecting telescope we have established the boundaries of the universe," Dr. Hubble said. "The distance has been computed through intrinsic luminosity and light years and in addition we have established that there are 2,000,000 solar systems like our own."
