Oregon Born Babies Have Fine Chance

That Oregon still holds the distinction of being the safest state in which to be born is proven by the 1928 summary report of the U. S. Public Health Service, received Monday at the office of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association in Portland.

This report shows that Oregon saves 948 babies out of each 1,000 living births. This is a higher ratio than is attained by any other state in the birth registration area. The nearest competitor is Washington, where 944 out of each 1000 are saved. Minnesota comes third with a ratio of 933 per 1000. The poorest showing is made by Arizona where only 880 babies are saved through the first year of life.

REVIVAL OF SMUGGLING ALONG ENGLISH COAST

LONDON. — (UP) — Smuggling, a lucrative profession carried on in Britain over a hundred years ago, is showing a marked revival and is greatly perturbing the Board of Trade officials who are responsible for the patrolling of Britain's shores.

Along the coastline of the English Channel are numerous hamlets and villages whose local history is rich in smuggling legends of the old days, when government activity finally made this business too frisky to be carried on.

In these remote spots a successful revival of smuggling is being carried out on a large scale due to the poor supervision these places receive from the coast-guard patrols.

K. O. BLOW WAS ON JAW

Boston Kid Talked About Foul Hit Too Late in The Game

NEW YORK, July 28.—Bitterness, recrimination, and suspicion have followed the spectacular and much-disputed victory of Jack Dempsey over Jack Sharkey.

There are those among the experts—most noticeably the experts who were wrong in their predictions—who believed Dempsey fouled his opponent and that Sharkey should have been declared the winner.

A few go so far as to declare that the former champion committed the foul deliberately to save himself from defeat.

And there is talk of a big gambling "coup" effected by Arnold Rothstein and others who are declared to have wagered heavily upon Dempsey at the last moment.

The logic of these claims is questionable. The writer believed that Sharkey would defeat Dempsey and is far from convinced right now that the Bostonian is not the better man. But the sudden crash in Luthania preferred was not due to dumbness.

Sharkey was struck twice, or three times in the seventh round with short, swishing uppercuts to the body, the blows landing below the belt of his thighs. Those purple lights were hanging high that night, however.

Dempsey's body blows were not low enough to incapacitate Sharkey by reason of their location. One of the punches undoubtedly did knock most of the wind and all of the sense out of the Lithuanian, however.

Instead of covering up and pushing a claim of foul afterwards, Sharkey groped out towards his weaving opponent, leaving his jaw unprotected.

Probably neither Dempsey nor the gamblers who backed him will ever again have an opening for easy money like that one. The knockout punch plunked to the tip of Sharkey's sagging jaw with neatness and dispatch.

Now if Sharkey had gone down from the effect of the body blows alone, he would have had an excellent chance of claiming a foul and "getting away with it." But he failed to enter his claim in time, and after the clip on the chin, Referee Jack O'Sullivan did the proper thing in tolling the fatal count of ten over the Lithuanian's prostrate form.

CHIEF GETS SINGED

Speaking of grass fires "Pop" Smith, right-hand man of Fire Chief Baughman says "the chief gets 'em and I put 'em out."

He tells of one fire recently which spread more rapidly than Chief Baughman anticipated and as the flames headed away from the flames he attempted to cross a barbed wire fence too rapidly and found himself held tight, his trousers caught in the wire. The flames rolled over and approached the chief who tugged violently to escape the flames which crept near. He made his escape from the on-rushing flames as the seat of his trousers gave way, and "Dad" turned the hose on him.
