BOLD DEFENSE OF AMERICAN POLICY MADE

Coolidge Sanctions U. S. Naval Police in Document to be Read at Arms Limitation Conference in Geneva—Disturbed by Apparent Failure.

GENEVA, Aug. 1.—(UP)—The plenary session of the naval limitation conference scheduled for today was postponed until 3 p. m. Thursday at the suggestion of the Japanese delegation, which announced however there were no plans to propose which would save the conference from failure.

RAPID CITY, S. D., Aug. 1.—(UP)—President Coolidge has sanctioned the bold pronouncement of American naval policy which may be delivered in Geneva today by Hugh Gibson, head of the American delegation at the Arms Limitation Conference, it was learned. Without lecturing other nations for their failure to enter into the spirit of disarmament, or blaming them directly for a breakdown of the Geneva conference, the document sets forth clearly that this government will countenance no international agreements to permit larger navies than now ride the seas under the colors of the nations of the world.

The document was prepared by Gibson at Geneva and forwarded here for ratification. Mr. Coolidge endorsed it wholeheartedly and cabled Gibson to deliver it at the final plenary session of the disarmament meeting Monday if he deems it desirable. Mr. Coolidge is extremely disturbed by the apparent breakdown of the conference. While he earnestly desires to prevent any international ill-will to grow out of an unsuccessful attempt to limit naval expenditures, he will see to it that the American public is informed of the situation so that the American public is informed of the situation so that it may know why taxes cannot be reduced to rock bottom.

Fiscal Year of Organization Ends September 1—Work Outlined

Activities of the Ashland Y. M. C. A. for the last three and a half months under the direction of Secretary W. P. Walters are outlined in a report recently submitted by Mr. Walters.

The fiscal year of the organization closes September 1, and payment of pledges for the work is urged in order that the year may be closed without a deficit. The present outlook is reported as bright.

Included in activities of the last three and a half months are Hi-Y, pioneer clubs, picnics, recreational program at Hyatt Prairie, twilight baseball league, and the scout camp.

The Hi-Y boys ended their season of activities with a Mother and Son banquet and two picnics. Fifty pioneers were given a banquet by their mothers. A hike was made to Wagner Gap. The secretary during June handled the recreational program for two Sunday school picnics, promoted a twilight baseball league, playground baseball, and tennis for the boys. The two weeks Y. M. C. A. Camp at Lake of the Woods, and the three-day camp for younger boys at Wagner Gap are included in detail in the report filed by Mr. Walters.

In the Christian work of the organization, 14 boys during April made Christian decisions and 13 of these boys united with various churches. Eight talks have been given by the secretary.

U. of O. Student to Spend Three Years at Oxford University, England

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Aug. 1.—(Special)—Alfonso Korn, Oregon winner of the 1927 Rhodes Scholarship, will leave Eugene August 3 on the first lap of the journey which will end at Oxford University, England, where he has a three year scholarship in the honor school of English language and literature.

He will spend some time in the Middle West, particularly in Chicago, before going to New York, whence he will sail on September 3, for Paris.

Mr. Korn will remain in Paris until October 7 and then will go to London for a week before beginning his work at Oxford on October 14.

He is graduating from the University of Oregon at the end of summer session where he has majored in English literature.

ULTIMATUM IS TO BE OFFERED BY EVANGELIST

With the Aid of Attorneys Aimee Declares She Hopes to Reorganize Financial Affairs of Four Square Gospel With Mrs. Kennedy Stepping Down

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 1.—(UP)—A final conference to settle all differences between Aimee Semple McPherson and her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, will be held here either Monday or Tuesday, the noted evangelist said Sunday night.

With the aid of attorneys, she declared, she hopes to definitely decide Mrs. Kennedy's future status at Angelus Temple and to reorganize the financial affairs of the Four Square Gospel.

Mrs. McPherson said she thought her mother would resign from business management of the Temple and that a property settlement would be made with her.

Mrs. Kennedy issued a lengthy statement in which she reiterated her contention that her daughter was receiving extremely poor counsel.

"Sister and I could settle the entire controversy in a few minutes," she said, "if she would come to me as a daughter to a mother."

"But she chooses to deal through a committee which I refuse to recognize. I expect to leave Angelus Temple but the settlement must be between Sister and me without any committee in the background."

Labor Supply Exceeds Need Report Shows

Surplus of labor exists in practically all sections of Oregon, according to a report of the seasonal employment commission of the U. S. Employment service.

A surplus of unskilled labor exists in the Rogue River valley, according to the report. Pear picking which is to start about August 18 will make it possible to utilize a portion of this labor but with tourist help, a surplus is expected to be found at all times.

Road work on the Redwood highway is taking care of the employment problem for a great many men in the vicinity of Grants Pass. The harvesting of the berry crop was handled largely by local labor and school children there.

NEDERLANDS, Colo., Aug. 1.—(UP)—Two persons were killed and several injured late Sunday when a live wire fell among a crowd of tourists who were inspecting the Boulder Canyon Power Dam, below here.

The dead are: Warden N. P. Capps, of the State Reformatory at Buena Vista, Colo. A boy, whose name could not be learned.

The dam, located high up in Boulder Canyon, is several miles from a telephone and only details of the accident were included in first reports here.

487 WARNED BY OFFICERS DURING JULY

Few Speeders on Highway—Improper Headlight Adjustment Major Offense

Jackson county state traffic officers were busy during July.

Two hundred thirty-five motorists were warned concerning traffic violations during the month of July by State Traffic Officer C. P. Talent, according to a tabulated report of his activities for the month, filed with the state department. Ten arrests were made with six convictions and four cases still pending. During the 29 days he was on duty Officer Talent travelled 3,430 miles.

One stolen car was recovered by Officer Talent. Assistance was rendered 11 motorists by the two officers, six receiving aid from Talent and five from Nichols.

Improperly adjusted headlights seem to be the major violation in this county. Light raids conducted by the two officers were productive of results, Nichols ordering 103 auto owners to have headlights of their cars properly adjusted while Talent ordered 108 to remedy the same defect.

Speeding was not indulged in by many motorists the report of the officers would indicate. Six arrests for speeding were made by Nichols while Talent arrested two. Improper licenses, parking, etc., were included in the many violations which resulted in warnings.

LIGHTS HERE ARE AVERAGE

Five Pay Fines for Having No Tail Lights on Their Automobiles

State traffic officers for this district assisted by Ashland police conducted a light raid in this city Saturday night. Lights on 124 cars were tested with a 68 per cent O. K. test. This percentage of good lights is above average officers stated.

E. O. Smith and Glen Nichols, arrested by Traffic Officer Myrton, G. S. Klinge and V. O. N. Smith, arrested by Lieut. O. N. Nichols, and H. O. Schortgen, arrested by Traffic Officer C. P. Talent, each pleaded guilty to a charge of operating a car without a tail light when arraigned before Municipal Judge Clinton Baughman and paid a fine of \$2 each.

Other traffic violators arrested over the week-end were M. D. Ashcraft of Talent, charged with operating with illegal lights; James Nash, charged with speeding and driving without an operator's license.

Swimming is one of the most popular sports among children, according to Miss Fay Carver, playground supervisor, who has been conducting a class for local boys and girls at the Helman pool twice each week, for the last month.

FIVE AVIATION DEATHS OCCUR OVER HOLIDAY

New Airplane Regulations Planned by Chicago as Result of Series of Air Mishaps Over Weekend—Compulsory Use of Parachutes is Advocated.

NEWCASTLE, Indiana, Aug. 1.—(UP)—While 200 persons witnessed Lieutenant George Myers, pilot, and Paul W. Luthy and Evans Davis, passengers, were killed when their plane plunged to earth in flames.

WICHITA, Kans., Aug. 1.—(UP)—Lieutenants C. A. Pearson and Charles W. Luthy were killed when the oil airplane in which they were flying crashed to earth at the local airport.

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—(UP)—New airplane regulations, applicable to the entire country, are expected as a result of the investigation into five aviation deaths in Chicago within a week.

Colonel Paul Henderson, former assistant postmaster-general in charge of the airmail service and now president of the National Air Transport Company, is acting as deputy coroner in connection with the two fatal accidents here. He is expected to make the following recommendations:

1. Compulsory use of parachutes by all pilots and passengers. It has been pointed out that parachutes might have saved the lives of the two fliers killed Saturday when their machine caught fire.
2. Government licensing of all aviation schools.
3. Restriction of use of old and unsafe planes.
4. Abolition of low flying over cities.

Three persons were killed at Morton Grove last Sunday and two at Oaklawn Saturday, a few hours after the first important inquest into aviation deaths in Chicago had opened.

The two were George Zabriskie, 28, formerly an army flyer, who was employed here by the University of Aviation, and James Rose of Steger, Ill., whom he was teaching. Their plane, a new Swallow with an OX-5 engine, was said to have been only five weeks out of the factory at Wichita, Kan. It caught fire at an altitude of 1,000 feet and both men jumped as the machine plunged to earth.

"The aircraft operators' association has passed resolutions agreeing to submit to voluntary control by county authorities, Col. Henderson said, although at present there are no laws governing flying unless a plane crosses a state line.

Week-End Death Toll Is Heavy

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—(UP)—Twenty-nine persons were killed on the coast over the week-end. Eight were killed in automobile accidents, seven were suicides, seven were drowned, two were murdered, four shot to death, and one killed in a bomb explosion. An unidentified yacht was burned and sank off the Catalina Island, shortly before dawn today. Search by the coast guards failed to reveal any bodies.
