

### Good Roads And Advertising Are Distinctive Characteristics Of United States Says Australian

Roads in the United States and the value placed on advertising are outstanding characteristics of this country impressed on the minds of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Elliott of Forbes, New South Wales, Australia, who spent Thursday night in this city.

Mr. and Mrs. Forbes are en route to San Francisco from which port they will sail Wednesday, August 10, for their home, after five months spent in touring Great Britain, and the United States.

"I want to say that the United States has the best roads in the whole world. Two of the many wonderful things I learned in this country are how to make these marvelous roads and the value of advertising what you have," Mr. Elliott said.

Mr. Forbes has extensive grazing and agricultural interests in Australia. He was particularly interested in this phase of business in this country.

"Australia needs some United States advertising," he said. "Australia is a beautiful country and we have splendid tourist resorts and scenic beauties but we don't advertise them. I have made a plea for more wealthy sportsmen to come to Australia to spend their vacations for we can offer them everything," the Australian declared.

One major difference between the countries impressed on Mr.

Elliott was the fact that Australia is a primary producing country while the United States is a secondary producing country.

Mr. and Mrs. Elliott were lavish in their praise of American courtesy and hospitality and expressed much admiration for the beauties of Ashland.

### COUNTY HEALTH NOTES

Mosquitoes are found in almost every locality where there is an opportunity for them to breed, and the opportunity depends simply upon the presence at some time during the year of standing water. Mosquitoes have been more prevalent this year in Oregon on account of the late high water. The sloughs and standing backwaters are excellent breeding places for mosquitoes. Although malaria is an uncommon disease in this state if mosquito control is not given serious consideration, it will undoubtedly become more prevalent.

The control and extermination of mosquitoes involves the application of many methods. There are, however, three principle methods for preventing the breeding of mosquitoes. They are the draining of all standing or stagnant water, destroying the mosquito larvae with a larvicide, and the planting of top minnows, to eat the larvae.

The mosquito can only be exterminated by destroying all breeding places every two or three weeks following high water. Three parts of kerosene to two parts of crude oil is a good mixture to use in a spray pump. One ounce of oil properly used will cover fifteen square feet. Prevent breeding places by clearing ditches of grasses and weeds, and doing away with stagnant water. Waters which cannot be diked should be treated with a larvicide. A good larvicide made from tobacco can be bought. Paris green is also used as a larvicide in the proportion of one part of Paris green to three parts of hydrated lime, sharp stone, or dust. This is blown on the surface of the breeding place. Bodies of water which can neither be diked nor treated with a larvicide can be kept free of mosquito larvae by stocking with top minnows.

Male mosquitoes are vegetarians. Female mosquitoes are the biters. The females have developed a taste for blood and indeed blood has become indispensable for the full development of their eggs. Remembering how all important the generative instinct is we can well understand why the mosquito will return again and again to obtain her fill of this life-perpetuating fluid.

The most effective means are those which destroy the breeding places of the mosquito and prevent their multiplication. For the best results both community and individual efforts are necessary. The individual attacking the problem on his own premises can do much not only to rid his

own immediate neighborhood of mosquitoes, but the example thus set will perhaps stimulate his less enterprising neighbor. Largely reducing the number of mosquitoes will make life more pleasant and eliminate the disease which they may carry.

### Farm Helps

"Many farmers, being business men, keep a set of books to determine whether they are operating at a profit or a loss," said Frank L. Robinson, assistant professor of accounting, in an interview for Oregon newspapers.

"If the business farmer is operating at a loss a properly kept set of records will tell why he is losing money. He will compare the operations of one year with those of other years. Thus, if he keeps his various enterprises segregated he will know what is losing his money and which enterprises are profitable."

A farmer need not lose all he has without knowing it, explained Professor Robinson. He may discontinue unprofitable ventures and add those that are profitable. "Extensive records are not necessary," continued Professor Robinson. "A record of all cash received, its source, all cash paid out and what it went for are enough. At the close of each year a statement is prepared showing a list of assets and liabilities. From this he determines his net worth and how much he has gained or lost.

"If he should desire to know the profits or losses of any particular enterprise he keeps a labor report. If he has live stock a feed record will be used."

**Improving Potato Quality**  
Great Progress has been made in the past few years in the improvement of Oregon potato crop by the encouragement and assistance

given to growers for the planting of certified seed. It has been demonstrated that the yield per acre from certified seed is more than double that of the unimproved seed. Not only that, but the standard of quality has been raised, and under the system of state and federal inspection the potatoes from the certified seed are taking the highest grades. County Agent McWhorter of Washington county has been particularly successful in securing co-operation of farmers, with notably satisfactory results.

DENVER, Aug. 6.—(AP)—A new born baby boy howled lustily in the squallid home of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Cossident here Friday and added to the consternation of well-meaning social workers.

It was baby No. 7 for the family and the second born since 1921 when social workers here stirred up a national controversy by trying to force permanent birth control measures upon the couple.

After Baby No. 5 was born social leaguers prevailed upon a court to issue an order for sterilizing Mrs. Cossident. They claimed the mother showed only the mentality of a six-year-old, that the family lived in poverty and was unable to rear properly the five children already born to her.

The court order, however, was withdrawn almost immediately after a stormy discussion arose over the recommendation and Mrs. Cossident, feeling she had won a victory, announced to "the old cats" that she would "have as many kids as she wanted."
