
BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 8 .- (UP)-Governor Fuller today indicated he would not act on petitions asking further reprieves for the anarchists. Unless a reprieve should be granted, the men will be electrocuted early Thursday.

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 8-(UP)-Attorneys for Sacco and Van Zetti were today denied writs of habeas corpus by Justice George Anderson, member of the Massachusetts supreme court, thus ending the first legal battle to prevent the execution of the two radicals.

Arhur D. Hill, chief defense counsel, plans to go before the federal courts with a request that they intervene and then to either one of two justices of the U.S. supreme court who are vacationing in this state. They would be asked for a writ of certiorari, which would bring the noted case into the supreme court at Washington.

Neither prisoner took any food Sunday, it being the 22nd day of Sacco's hunger strike. Van Zetti has now joined him again in refusing food and both insist to their counsel that they will not eat again until they are granted a new trial.
