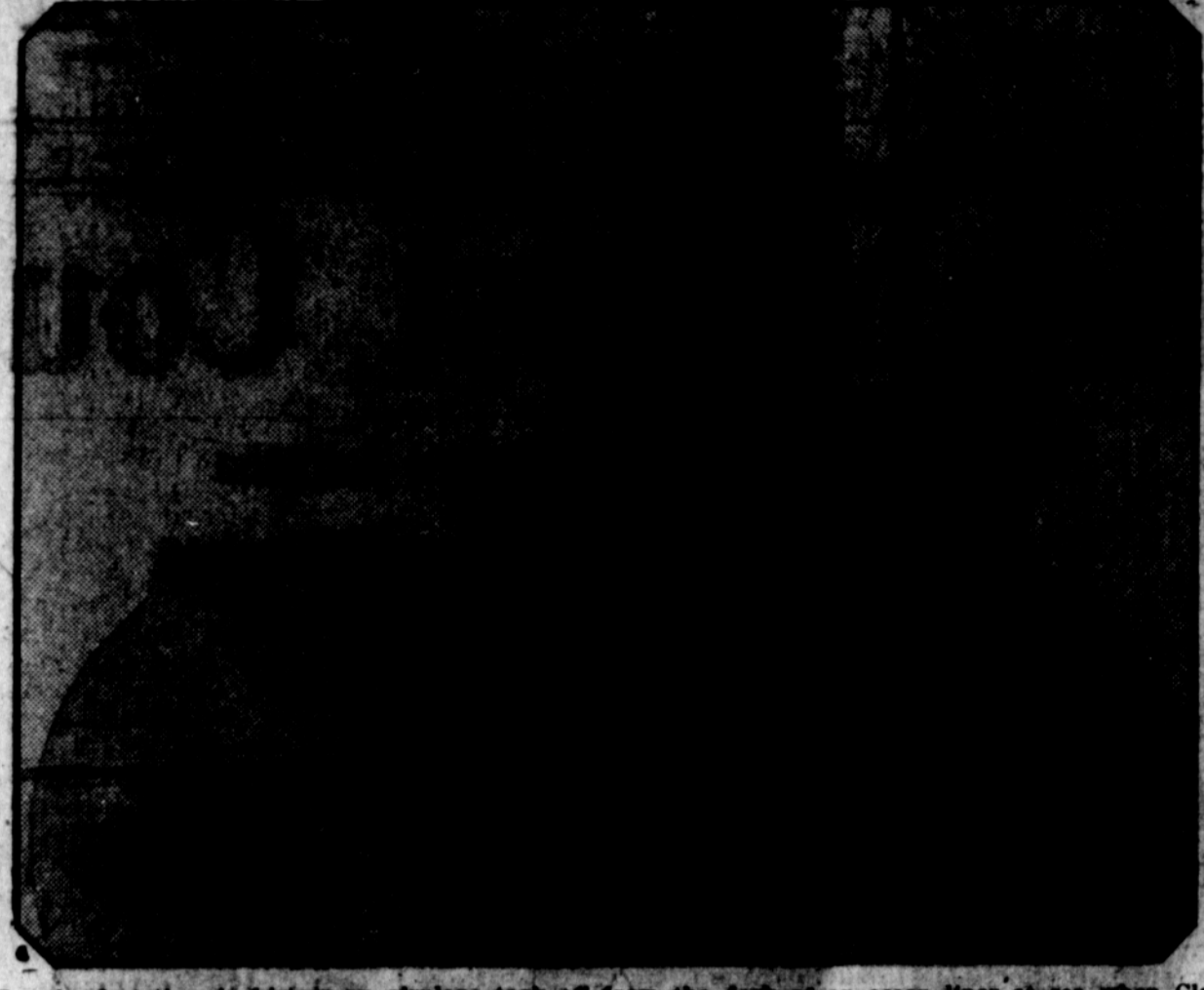
Dr. Wise and Wife Here—

Important Books Reviewed—
"The Adventures of an Oaf," by Herb Roth and Frank Sullivan. This is the funniest book in the funniest world by the funniest fellows that ever wrote funny stuff for funny kids to follow. Herb Roth, you will recall, did the illustrations for that classic, "The Letters of a Japanese School Boy." An "Oaf" you know, is Scandinavian for fool, and this is his story of one of those popular crises around the world—his world being a bit smaller than the regular size and therefore he does not have to travel "light" but is able to take with him most of his friends and family. Of particular importance is his nurse, Edna, the duck. Edna is one of those useful persons to be pressed into service for any emergency like holding the loose end of the clothes line under her wing and flying steadily in one spot for several hours required to dry the family wash. Then you meet his friend the onion—whose position is not so secure since the Oaf is led to philosophize: "Onions build one up physically, but they pull you down socially." And the alarm clock with the fingers on its hands, mighty convenient, too, now that we think of it. It is gorgeously colored and bound in blue with a yellow jacket that would delight the heart of any boy or girl and it is the kind of "funny paper" reading that they should have. Sophisticated enough to whet their wits and it is a real loss to them not to have it among their treasures.

Time For School Dresses Is Rapidly Approaching—
Incredible as it may seem, the time for school dresses is rapidly approaching again, but the Woman's Home Companion sees much comfort for the girl students and their mothers in the

fact that simplicity will be a compensated note in fall winter clothing.

Rayon jersey will be a great factor in making the preparation of a school wardrobe easy. The most attractive models of jersey dresses require only the simplest sewing, for aside from the pocket, the only details are the simple pleats which are the secret of giving these plain garments the air of elegance, there is little that must leave the spot in the very moment. Delightful, such shades, such as burgundy, brown and grey, are available in this serviceable material.

Plainness, however, detracts nothing from the smart appearance. To the contrary, the pleated skirts, adorning themselves to exuberant, youthful notes, are studied in grace. Useful and durable materials, too, fit exactly with the fall types of school dresses, cover and knits being very practical, especially with the new leather belts which have become so important. The simulated leathers, continuing in vogue, is another device which is highly convenient in constructing a garment which only requires a different selection of material to change it from a street or school frock to a house dress. 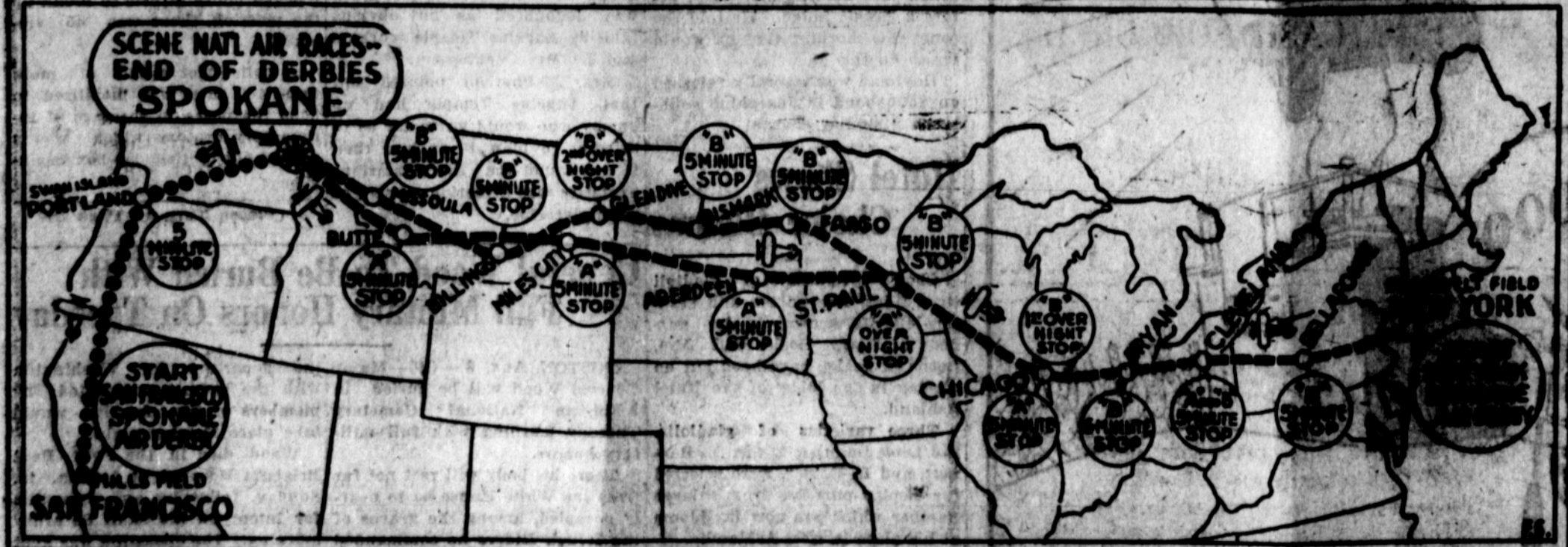

Encouragement of commercial aviation, linked with the thrilling sport of air races racing their way across the continent and up to the Pacific Coast, is making the National Air Derby race from New York to Spokane and the Pacific Coast Air Derby from San Francisco to Spokane the biggest aviation attraction in the United States this year. All plans and details for the two derby flights have practically been completed by officers of the National Air Derby Association of Spokane, Wash., an association which has pooled \$20,000 in cash prize money for the winners in the two contests, and the national air races to be held at the Spokane Air Port, September 23 and 24, following the finish of the derby on September 21.

The routes of the two derbies are shown above. Planes in the New York flight will hop off from Roosevelt Field, Long Island, New York, on September 19. They will fly by the route of the transcontinental air mail line to Chicago. At St. Paul the Class A airplanes, those equipped with more powerful engines, will take one route and the B class planes another route. Over-night and breakfast tables are ordered in order to show the feasibility of the over-night air way across the United States. Contestants in the San Francisco flight will hop off from Mills Municipal Air port, September 19.
