

### Prohibition Enforcement Makes Money for Uncle Sam; Country Once Rebelled on "Whiskey Tax"

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—Out here in this region where in George Washington's administration farmers took arms during the "Whiskey Rebellion" to avoid paying taxes on liquor, prohibition enforcement is a money-making activity for the United States Government.

During the first year of the administration of John D. Pennington the prohibition district which includes Western Pennsylvania and West Virginia did a business roughly estimated at \$972,000, and turned in a profit to Uncle Sam unofficially estimated at \$432,000.

Pennington, a retired lieutenant-commander in the navy, is the third prohibition administrator to hold office since the country was divided into districts under the "Andrews plan." His predecessor had quit the job in disgust, but Pennington took it up, promising nothing except to do "the best I can."

Revenues from unusual sources have poured into the government's coffers as a result of Pennington's activities. Confiscated property is sold; copper from stills produces a good revenue and even the sugar used by the illicit liquor makers nets several thousand dollars a year. While all of the fines and back taxes levied against convicted bootleggers have not yet been collected, here is an approximate balance sheet of operations in this district from July 15, 1926 to July 15, 1927:

### SHIPPERS FIND OLD SUBMARINE

#### Derelict Found by Steamer Liberator, Causes Concern

HONOLULU, Aug. 8.—(AP)—A new and menacing mystery of the sea, in the form of a derelict submarine floating across the shipping lanes near Midway Island, has aroused the interest and concern of shipping men here.

The derelict was discovered by the steamer Liberator, about 1150 miles out on a voyage from Honolulu to Yokohama. Aside from a brief report that the derelict was boarded, but that poisonous fumes prevented search of the wreck, no details of the find have been sent here.

Whether the hulk represents some new and hitherto unreported disaster of the Pacific, whether bodies are aboard, or whether some old wreck has been floating by an earth convulsion at the bottom of the sea, are points which are not clear.

The Liberator stated that the numbers "027" were on the submarine but this designation bears no connection with any craft known to have been in the vicinity.

This damage, which was contained in Pennington's report to the Treasury Department for the activities in June, 1927, represents damage of \$31.15 to bootleggers for each dollar spent by the prohibition unit.

#### Transformation in Attitude and Equipment of Tourists

Auto camping has been transformed from a joke to a community and national asset within the last few years.

The lowly flivver and the high-powered car of wealth mingle in truly democratic friendship on the Lithia Park Municipal camp grounds and everywhere the visitors at the camp grounds can be seen strolling about the local park and admiring its beauties.

It is only a few years ago motor campers with their frying pans, blankets, and tents draped over the family flivver were targets for the wise cracks of humorists everywhere.

Now these vacation campers are taken seriously and a recent survey showed there were 5,500 public tourist camps established through the United States to cater to their comfort. The tent is becoming an obsolete part of the equipment as tourists demand camp accommodations in the form of cabins equipped with electrical appliances.

The traditional hardships of camp life have been eliminated largely, by improvement in tourist park accommodations.

The original tourist camps boasted of little more than running water and sanitary facilities. Up-to-date camps such as the local camp, furnish comfortable cabins, well lighted and heated, fitted with modern bathing, laundering and electrical facilities.

Tourists frequently comment on splendid accommodations of the local camp.

### NEW USE FOR TOBACCO TAX

#### Cigarette Smokers of South Dakota Help Support Institution

"A luxury tax on tobacco was passed by the Louisiana State Legislature in July to provide additional revenue for the use of the public schools.

"The bill which provides for a tax of ten per cent on all sales of tobacco, was signed by the Governor on July 10, 1926. At three different times in its history the bill was barely saved from being laid on the table. It required two roll calls to pass the bill, which after six weeks of constant effort was enacted by a vote of fifty-two yeas, fifty-one being required.

"Thus in the face of widespread opposition by the tobacco interests, was passed an act which will immeasurably benefit the children of Louisiana. All educators who are trying to pass a truly constructive measure should take heart from this victory and realize that through their publicity and untiring efforts the educators of Louisiana have gained their object."

Cigarette smokers help pay for education in South Dakota, as the proceeds from this tax is utilized for a specific educational project.

"The cigaret tax for July amounted to \$28,610. The law will be in effect for the biennial and if the July sum is received each of the remaining 23 months, a total of \$686,640 will be realized from this source."

LONDON, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Seven thousand persons, massed in Trafalgar Square in the heart of London Sunday, heard communist and other orators denounce America because of Governor Fuller's decision that Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanetti must die.

Resolutions, proposed by leaders, and approved with shouts by the demonstrators, threatened a general strike if necessary to save the condemned men and provided for protests to be sent to the American I. W. W. and Communist party.
