**NEEDA BOTT TRIPS OF CLOTHES FOR THE STOUT NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—(AP)—** The few stout women left in this dieting world find it difficult to buy smart clothes in large sizes. True, some houses specialize on "stout" dresses but even there the smarter garments are in medium sizes.

There's one thing which the stout woman should remember when buying a gown—surplus flesh demands surplus bodice lines! When the large woman fails to cut down on her weight she must rely upon the cut of the gown for "slenderizing." Surplice front effects in bodices do much towards making one appear less rotund. The surplice is not necessarily a matronly style. For instance, the dress made with a surplice front which ties at one side without necessitating the wearing of a vestee is most youthful. As a rule the bodice joins a pleated front tunic. More matronly, are surplices with reserves and yokes which form a V shape as they join the tunic. The dress that isn't made on surplice lines may use a long strand of beads to aid in apparently dividing the breadth of the figure.

One-sided and V-shaped necklines are preferred to other types by women with matronly figures. One-piece frocks are also preferred above two-piece types in most instances. Diagonal skirt manipulation is used on many models which vary from the general vertical skirt effect. Tiers, flounces and any skirt trimming which tends to increase one's breadth are poor substitutes for vertical or diagonal lines.

Large women are getting away from wearing black to a great extent. Black and white effects, navy blues, beige, flesh and even white effects are said to be leading stout shade. Printed materials are well liked by most large

women, the print usually being used with solid color for contrast. The combination of two materials is also well liked. Lace and chiffon combinations add a softness which is flattering to plump figures.

### Growing Plants in a Sponge

The sponge makes an excellent soil in which to grow certain decorative plants. For a very effective window display soak a large piece of coarse sponge in water, squeeze it half dry, then sprinkle in the sprouting seed, clover seed, millet, barley, lawn grass, oats, rice, etc. Hang this in the window where the sun shines a portion of the day, and sprinkle it lightly with water daily.

The sponge soon lives into a mass of living green vegetation very refreshing to the eye. The seeds used may be varied, according to the fancy, but the above named seeds in a hanging sponge are prettier than a sponge set in a dish or plate, though excellent results may also be obtained by planting other seeds, grapefruit seeds, carrots, etc.

The seeds which produce delicate feathery leaves are the prettiest for indoor plants. Golden millet brings a surprisingly quick result in leaves and decorative "fruit." Sweet clover seed also brings quick results, and has a hardness not so easily effected by change in temperature as many seeds have. Creeping bent grass seed produces a dense growth and is also very hardy.

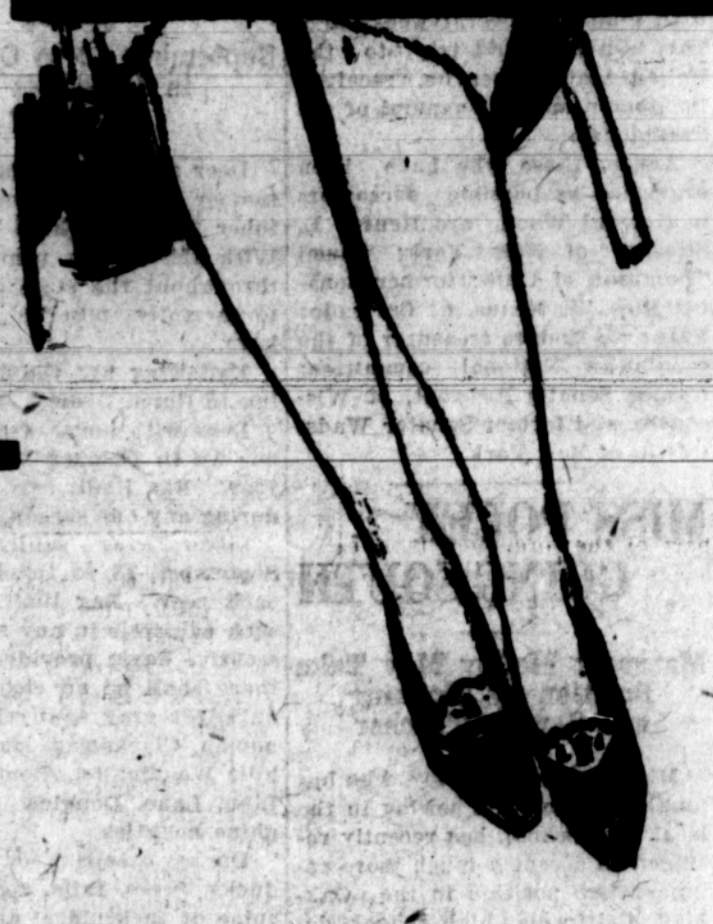

## Weather Bureau Cooperates In Giving Forest Fire Protection

Extreme forest fire hazards are always the result of low humidity, according to the U. S. Forest Service. It is pointed out that

while the forest fire hazard has been less than usual during the present season, due to favorable weather conditions, it would take only a few days of low relative humidity to increase the hazard to the danger point.

The importance of this factor is indicated by the fact that some insurance companies are now granting reduced rates on timberland in the Pacific Northwest when the owner agrees to suspend all logging operations for any period during which the relative humidity is below 30 per cent.

On account of the probability of low humidity periods during the next six or eight weeks, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and other agencies concerned with the protection of Federal, State and private forests from fire are keeping an watchful eye on the weather these days as the navigators of ships at sea. Increasing realization of the important role the weather plays in the forest fire hazard has led the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture to establish a systematic forest-fire-weather warning service in several sections of the country, and regular forecasts are being sent out to apprise foresters and forest owners of dangerous fire weather so that they may shut down logging operations and slash burning, and mobilize firefighting units with the least possible delay.

Here in the Pacific Coast region, where some of the most valuable forests in the United States are situated, the fire-weather-warning work has been under way for some time. Fire-weather forecasts are issued twice

daily by the Weather Bureau and are disseminated by telegraph to important key points, by radio and by newspapers. The radio broadcasting of these forecasts is one of the most recent developments, and fire-weather bulletins now are being sent out from the 16 Pacific Coast and Northwestern stations.

The worst fires in Washington and Oregon occur in connection with the dreaded west wind, are preceded by a period of warm dry weather fires start easily.

The fire-weather-warning service now is in operation in seven districts: Oregon, with headquarters at Portland; Washington, with headquarters at Seattle, California, with headquarters at San Francisco; Montana and Northern Idaho, with headquarters at Spokane; Southern Idaho, with headquarters at Boise; Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan, with headquarters at Duluth; New York and New England, with headquarters at Boston.
