Liberally armed state troopers and police officers guarded the crowded courtroom as the case was brought back to the scene of its original hearing.

Chinese pheasant may be killed in any seven consecutive days; provided further, that there shall be no open season on Chinese pheasants in Lingdon, Tillamook, Clatsop and Curry counties in game district No. one (1) in the state of Oregon.

There shall be no open season for mountain or plumed and California or valley quail, except that in Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry counties the open season shall be from October 15 to October 31 of each year. Bag limit, ten of such birds in any seven consecutive days.

Open season during month of November in Josephine and Jackson counties. All other counties open season all year.

## Vacationists Are Warned Of Danger Of Impure Water While Camping Out

The highways are flooded with pleasure seekers taking advantage of the automobile as a means of transportation. Many traveling overland carry their baggage for camping while cities and towns provide camp sites to accommodate the traveler. In most camps fairly good hygienic accommodations are to be had; but there are camps supplied by unhealthful water and with open vaults for excreta from the body, and such camps are a source of danger to the camper.

Travelers also frequently camp near a stream or near the highway and there cook meals, do their washing, and perform other usual necessities. The water secured from nearby streams is used for cooking and drinking purposes. This practice certainly furnishes a source of infection to the camper.

Many who travel through the mountainous countries think of the streams flowing through the valleys and in the mountains as the source of purity. This is erroneous. The penetration of man's feet into places heretofore kept out of only wild beasts of the forest has all too often carried pollution into these streams. Then again the practice of irrigation of the lands in these districts infects the streams. The water flowing over the land absorbs pollution of human origin.

Water-borne diseases make the consideration by hygiene important to everyone. Not only is it important to the traveler, but to each individual in his community. It is the duty of each one of us to interest himself in the source of water supply and the system by which the sewage is carried away from our community.

A certain city of 15,000 population had a typhoid epidemic. Investigation showed that the main sewer of the city emptied into the river about one hundred yards above the intake of the water supply to the city. Another smaller city obtained its water supply from a so-called deep well. The incidence of typhoid, in this community, was directly traceable to a surface leak whereby polluted surface drainage found its way into the well, thence to the community, resulting in many cases of typhoid.

A brief discussion of typhoid fever may be helpful in assisting the individual to broaden his interest in hygiene. Typhoid is perhaps the most common of water-borne diseases. When we say "water-borne" it is necessary for clarity to tell you that typhoid may also be carried in food stuffs like oysters, celery, and other foods coming into contact with polluted water or carried by flies or infected fingers of individuals caring for typhoid patients.

Typhoid fever is very common in many parts of the United States in the spring and fall. It is due to a germ known as the Typhoid Bacillus, which organism must be ingested or eaten by the individual in order for infection to occur. The course of the disease runs for a period of from six to eight weeks, and sometimes much longer. It carries a death rate of from seven to fourteen percent, and often leaves those who recover with permanent lesions.

It is well to know that the use of vaccine prevents typhoid fever. The United States Army is rendered practically free of typhoid by its use. Certainly in households where typhoid fever exists the remaining uninfected members should receive the vaccine. Individuals travelling into areas where overcrowding has resulted, as from recent flood areas, would be justified in being vaccinated against typhoid before going into such areas.

When in doubt about the purity of water, boil it. Take no chance with a disease whose death rate is so high.

## Campaign For Prunes Fails

**SAN JOSE, Cal., Aug. 9.**—(UP)—In a statement issued last night Frank Abernathy, president of the California Prune Producers' association, declared that the campaign to effect a merger of prune interests in order to place the industry on a stable basis had failed.

Only 27,338 acres of the 49,000 required to carry out the association's plans for cooperation between growers and packers had been pledged to the movement, Abernathy said.
