

JUDGE ORDERS GIFT RETURN

\$550,000 Donated by Millionaire Indian Declared Forced

NEW YORK, Aug. 10. (AP)—Federal Judge John C. Knox handed down a decision ordering the American Baptist Home Mission Society and the Equitable Trust Company, as trustee, to return to the United States Secretary of the Interior, the sum of \$550,000 which Jackson Barnett, millionaire Creek Indian, of Oklahoma, was alleged to have made as a gift to the society.

Judge Knox minced no words in his decision and made it plain that he more than suspected that efforts had been made to mulct the Indian of his money. "Here is an illiterate Indian now in the neighborhood of 77 years of age," the judge said, "who until he became a wealthy man was allowed to shift for himself and to eke out an existence as best he could, from the time oil was found upon his allotment of land, he has been the shuttle-dore in a game of battledore, in which the stakes were high. "Solicited and importuned for donations to which he readily affixed his thumbprint for almost anyone who asked it; kidnaped and married by an adventurer; harassed and annoyed by his attorneys and their allies who enlisted the support of officials of the government—and who were probably convinced of the justification of their subsequent action—he was finally induced to part with the liberty bonds in the vast sum of \$1,100,000."

DRY LEADER WILL SERVE

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 10. (AP)—Executive clemency for Dr. E. S. Shumaker, superintendent of the Indiana "Anti-Saloon League who was sentenced to a 60-day jail term for contempt of court, will not be asked with his consent, it has been learned. Rather than plead for mercy, the dry leader is ready to enter the state prison at Putnamville to serve the sentence. Close friends declared he was unwilling to ask Governor E. C. Jackson for a pardon, because "to petition for mercy might be construed as an admission of guilt."

Circuit Judge Is Appointed

Circuit Judge Alger Fox of Pendleton, has been appointed circuit judge to preside over the session scheduled for August 15 in the absence of Judge C. M. Thomas on account of illness. Judge Thomas was operated on in Portland recently and has not recovered sufficiently to take his place on the bench this month. A plea for a judgment of \$50,000 against the Beall Pipe and Tank company of Portland has been filed by McEwan, who was gassed while working with a blow torch in their pipe lines between Medford and the Big Butte Springs. He lay unconscious in their pipe line for three hours, he states.

FIRST PEAR CAR SHIPPED

MEDFORD, Aug. 10. — With Eastern market prices on Bartlett pears set at \$4.00, the first carload of fruit to be shipped out of Rogue River valley was put on the rails yesterday evening by H. Van Hovenburg at Gold Hill. The car is bound for Simons Shuttleworth and French company of New York and was contracted for in the valley through Guy W. Connor, their agent. Grown in the Siskiyou orchards in Sam valley, the pears are strictly first grade extra fancy stock packed in three rows. The fruit was picked Monday following satisfactory "ripeness" tests and rushed through the packing and into the waiting lead-car.

Southern Oregon fruit is in great demand in the east, Mr. Van Hovenburg declared yesterday, due to the fact that the valley growers have successfully surmounted the spray residue obstacles and can put pears in eastern fruit stands which will pass every test and satisfy the most fastidious. Both Connor and Van Hovenburg were pleased to be able to ship the first car out of the valley and with the excellent prices prevailing in New York they look for a season in 1927 which will repay the heavy losses of 1926 when the spray question clipped such big chunks out of the growers' returns. Last year valley orchardists shipped out 2196 carloads of fruit and at the beginning of the season this year it looked as though the present crop would fall short. As the summer progresses it becomes more apparent, Mr. Van Hovenburg stated, that the two figures would not be far divergent with 1927 about 90 per cent as strong as the preceding year.

New Airplane Is Designed

NEW YORK, Aug. 10. (AP)—Giuseppe Bellanca, designer of the Trans-Atlantic plane Columbia, is at work on plans for a Trans-oceanic mystery airplane, said to have been ordered by an internationally known flier eager to establish a new distance record. Construction of the plane will be started in September on the airplane, which will be a monoplane, similar to the Columbia in general outline, but radically different in details of construction and in cruising radius. The new ship will be able to fly between 5500 and 6,000 miles it was said, and will carry 2 men. A 450-horse power Pratt and Whitney Motor will be used.

GEHRIG BATS 38 HOME RUNS

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 10. (AP)—Lou Gehrig, first baseman of the New York Yanks, batted out his 38th home run of the season in the ninth inning of Tuesday's game with the Philadelphia Athletics. The blow was off Walberg and there was no one on base.

Two Models Of Fords Appear

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 10. (AP)—The mystery resulting from the secrecy with which Henry Ford has surrounded the plans for his new car was doubled by the appearance of two different kinds of test models on the roads around his experimental laboratories. One of the models was equipped with drums which obviously contained four-wheel brakes. The other model had drums on all the wheels, but those attached to the front wheels were so small that it was doubtful whether they contained brakes. On one of the cars the heavy machinery under the body and on the rear axle led to the belief that the car was equipped with a gear shift instead of a clutch shift. There was nothing about the other car, however, to prompt that conclusion.

Both models were equipped with wire wheels. They were painted dark green and slate gray. They appeared to be capable of greater speed than the present models for they whizzed by the observer at a fast clip.

Britain Builds Super Plane

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., Aug. 10. (AP)—Great Britain's hopes of winning the famous Schneider cup race for seaplanes soared skyward when in a test here a super-marine Napier 25 developed a speed estimated unofficially at 300 miles an hour. The 1926 Schneider cup race at Baltimore was won at a speed of 246.496 miles an hour. The Napier plane is being tuned up for the 1927 race, to be held near Venice Sept. 25. A Gloster-Napier four, tested with it, made nearly as great speed.

Tips for Hunters

IT IS ALWAYS UNLAWFUL To hunt at night. To hunt on any game refuge. To hunt deer with dogs. To wantonly waste game. To sell plumage of game or song birds. To disguise sex of any game animal or game bird. To shoot from public highway or railroad right of way. To hunt on lands without permission of the owner. To lie in wait for deer at or near licks. To hunt without having on person a license, or to refuse to show license on demand of proper officer. To sell or offer for sale, barter or exchange any of the game animals or game birds, or parts thereof, of the state of Oregon. To take up any game animal or game bird for the purpose of holding same in captivity. To rob any bird's nest, except such birds as are not protected by law. To hunt or shoot from a power-boat, sink or sneak-boat, or sink box. To trap fur-bearing animals without a license. To trap, net, or ensnare game animals and game birds, except fur-bearing animals. To resist game wardens or other officers charged with the enforcement of the game laws. To hunt within the corporate limits of any city or town, public park or cemetery, or on any campus, or grounds of any public school, college or university or within the boundaries of any watershed reservation as set aside by act of Congress to supply water to cities and towns, or within any state or national game reservation. To kill mountain sheep, mountain goats, antelope, moose, elk, female deer, spotted fawn or deer of the first year, silver, golden or Reeves pheasants, Franciscan grouse or fool hens, swan, wood ducks, elder ducks, wild turkeys, least sandpiper, western sandpiper, solitary sandpiper, snowy plover, doves pigeons, dowitchers, godwits, knots, oyster catchers, stilts, surfbirds, gulls, loons, and all birds of other kinds, except those not protected and on which there is an open season. To hunt game birds and game animals between sunset and one-half hour before sunrise. To use a light of any kind in hunting any of the game animals or game birds of the state of Oregon. To hunt, pursue, molest, catch, kill or destroy any game animals or game birds from an automobile — power-propelled vehicle, or other mechanical conveyance. For any person to hunt without a license. PENALTIES Persons killing or molesting mountain sheep, mountain goat, antelope, elk, moose or caribou may be fined from \$200 to \$1,000 and imprisonment for not less than 30 days. Penalty for killing deer unlawfully, or having deer or parts of deer in possession unlawfully, is from \$50 to \$500. Unless otherwise provided, violations of other sections of the game laws carry penalties of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500 and costs, or imprisonment not less than 30 days nor more than 6 months. Besides fines, anyone violating laws shall be subject to civil action for damages ranging from \$2 for game birds to \$300 for elk and mountain sheep and goats; \$100 to \$200 for deer; antelope, \$100 to \$200; shall forfeit all guns, dogs, boats, fishing apparatus used in violation of laws.
