Naughty Talk On Telephone Cost Man \$10

LONDON. —(P)—Telephones are often the cause of bad language but anyone who goes so far as to give vent to such wrath over the phone is in danger of fine in England.

George Walter Cox, Witcher street, New Cross, London, was fined \$10 a \$3.50 costs for using bad language on the phone.

More than 60 irate telephone operators at the New Cross exchange declared they had been annoyed for some time by "grossly offensive language" addressed to them from booths.

Cox, it was said, was kept in conversation by an operator while a message was sent to a news agent near the booth, who followed Cox and took him to the police station.

He admitted having used the booth on several occasions and said he always used the same kind of talk, denying, however, that he had ever employed "really obscene" language.

To add to his misfortunes, one of the allegations in the summons was "wasting electric current valued four cents."

PHILADELPHIA GETS SESSION

1928 Convention of National Fire Chief's Association Will be in East

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—(P)—Following a spirited election, Philadelphia was selected as the 1928 convention city by the International Fire Chief's association in convention here Friday.

Previous to the award, officers were elected in the accepted manner of advancement. They were Ross B. Davis, Philadelphia, president; John M. Evans, New Orleans, first vice-president; James J. Mulcahey, Yonkers, N. Y., recording secretary and Peter B. Carter, Collingwood, N. J., secretary.

Ralph J. Scott, Los Angeles, was elected second vice-president and, according to custom, will become president two years hence.
