PRINCE SAYS HE IS "GOAT"

Wealthy Society Matron Double Crossed Him, He Declares

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 25.—(UP)—Swan Singh, Hindu prince, whose past few days have been turbulent with unpaid hotel bills, motion picture actresses and police, was the "goat" in his dealings with Mrs. Elizabeth C. T. Miller, wealthy Cleveland matron, he declared Wednesday as he carried his battle into court.

Singh, member of a prominent family of Kashmir, India, filed a complaint against Mrs. Miller in superior court, asking for a total of \$9,959 for money advanced, services rendered and goods sold.

According to his suit, the prince is out four gold pencils, worth \$1500 each; a sum of \$3250 for his services as publicity and booking agent for Mrs. Miller, and \$709.55 in cash.

In the treble capacity of advance, booking and publicity agent, Singh alleged, he earned \$250 monthly from July, 1926 to August, 1927, but the total, \$3250, has not been paid by Mrs. Miller.

He never has been reimbursed for travel bills to the extent of \$259.55, accumulated in Mrs. Miller's service, nor for the \$320 he advanced to a member of Mrs. Miller's entourage, he claimed.

Finally, he sold her four gold embroidered pencils from his home land, the complaint recites. Each of them was worth \$1500, the prince said, but he has never been successful in collecting.

WHO OWNS PIGEON

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 25.—(UP)—A carrier pigeon, with a legband numbered PHC 340 AT 27 on its left foot, alighted apparently exhausted in Inverness, on Tomales bay, near here, Wednesday. BROKE STALACTITE

Charged with breaking a stalactite in the Oregon Caves during a trip through the caverns, William H. Potter of Glandora, California, appeared here and gave bail of \$10 to appear before United States Commissioner James Holman, where he stated the stalactite was broken unintentionally. He stated that he was inspecting the formation and that it broke off. This is the first case of this kind reported this season—Grants Pass Courier.
