 CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 26.—(UP)—Although 50 men spurred on by the promise of reward money, offered for the capture of three prisoners who escaped from the county jail yesterday, have scoured the country hereabouts, no trace of the fugitives has been found.  
 County commissioners today offered a reward of \$500 for the capture of Emmett Bailey, under death sentence for the murder of his ex-wife; \$100 reward for W. E. Roberts, negro, held for robbery and \$50 for the capture of A. J. Burke held on a rape charge.  
**Hawaii As Economic Factor Is Discussed**  
 UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Aug. 26.—(Special)—Hawaii is far more important as a factor in the promoting of peace in the Pacific area, and in an industrial and economic way, than it is as a summer resort, declared George H. Godfrey, University editor who spoke here before the Kiwanis club. Mr. Godfrey has just returned to Oregon after spending a year and a half in the territory where he was city editor and editor of the Hilo Tribune-Herald.  
 Hawaii is practically ideal for outings and pleasure jaunts the year round, and is full as enticing as it is pictured to be, said Mr. Godfrey, but the fact that the territory has a population of over 300,000 busy people, who produce sugar, pineapples and other products considerably in excess of \$100,000,000 a year, is often overlooked. It is also enlightening to know that the islands paid more federal taxes last year than did twelve of the states on the main land.  
 A factor that is even more vital than the economic importance of Hawaii is the race assimilation experiment that is now being carried on there. Out of the population of over 300,000 only 36,000 are of Caucasian extraction. The balance are Oriental races, such as Japanese, Chinese, Koreans, Filipinos, and others, in addition to natives. These people, with different backgrounds and culture, are living and working in harmony; their children are growing up side by side on terms of equality. This experiment proves, experts contend, that if people become familiar with one another, understand each other, and are willing to give and take, it is possible for races to exist, not only in such a limited territory as Hawaii, but all over the world.  
 Hawaii is also vitally important as a meeting place for organizations that are promoting a better diplomacy and a better feeling for peace in the Pacific. "War is now perhaps only a remote possibility in the Pacific area, but misunderstandings can arise, as has been demonstrated by resultant wars in other parts of the world," Mr. Godfrey pointed out. "At Honolulu are formed such groups as the Institute of Pacific Relations, the Pan-Pacific Union, and others, which study possible points of conflict, and endeavor to bring the peoples of the Orient and Occident into closer and more friendly contact. Thus the possibility of war will be kept remote."  
 Mr. Godfrey also mentioned the fact that should trouble ever break out in the Pacific the United States has a mighty arsenal over 16,000 trained military
