TWO LOCAL BOYS JOIN U. S. NAVY

Eight Youths From Southern Oregon Sent to San Diego

Carl E. Stevens and T. L. Hull of this city are among the men who have recently enlisted in the U. S. Navy at the Southern Oregon Recruiting Station at Grants Pass, according to H. T. Edson, recruiting officer for this district.

Others who have enlisted at the Grants Pass office recently are: D. R. Hammond, T. N. Harris, and H. S. Marsters, Roseburg; Ivan T. Ritch, Grants Pass; Paul M. Robinson, Wilderville; B. L. Snider, Medford.

The men have been sent to the main recruiting station, located at Portland and will go from there to the U. S. Naval Training Station, San Diego, California for an eight weeks stay, receiving necessary dental, medical treatment, if necessary and being outfitted in regulation uniform. This training precedes their being assigned to a Man-of-War.

At the present time, according to Mr. Edson, the Navy has 55 trades for men to choose from. Ages for enlistment are from 17 to 35. Full information regarding enlistments is furnished by Mr. Edson upon application.

Miss Irene Stanley of Talent will replace Hazel Wiley as a clerk in the forestry department offices in Medford. Miss Wiley is transferred to Grants Pass.

FIRE COVERS GREAT AREA

Backfiring and Blasting Falls to Curb Great Blaze

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 26.—(AP)—With approximately 15,000 acres already devastated, 1500 fire-fighters were battling with small effect, to check the fire in the Angelus forest north of Newhall, termed the worst since the San Gabriel blaze in 1924. To date backfiring, blasting and use of tank-tractors have failed to curb the fire which started on the Ridge route, near Sandberg's resort, Sunday.

The present hope of fire-fighters is to direct the blaze into the Gillette mine scar of 1924, where it can do little damage and will quickly burn itself out.
