Because Americans form a onsiderable patronage of ballroom it is believed the bomb may have been hurled by Sacco - Vanzetti sympathizers.

BOSTON, Aug. 27.-(LP)-In a heavily guarded north end undertaking establishment, the bodies of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Van Zetti were viewed by thousands Friday and today.

Sympathizers passed the flower bedecked biers in an endless stream: Each was permitted only a second's glance, for outside the street was packed with men, women and children, awaiting their turn.

Only one bit of excitement marked the activities. This was when Miss Mary Donovan of the defense committee struggled with police who attempted to wrest from her several placards.

The incident resulted in the arrest of Miss Donovan, who will appear in court today on a charge of "obstructing the face passage of

foot traffic."




