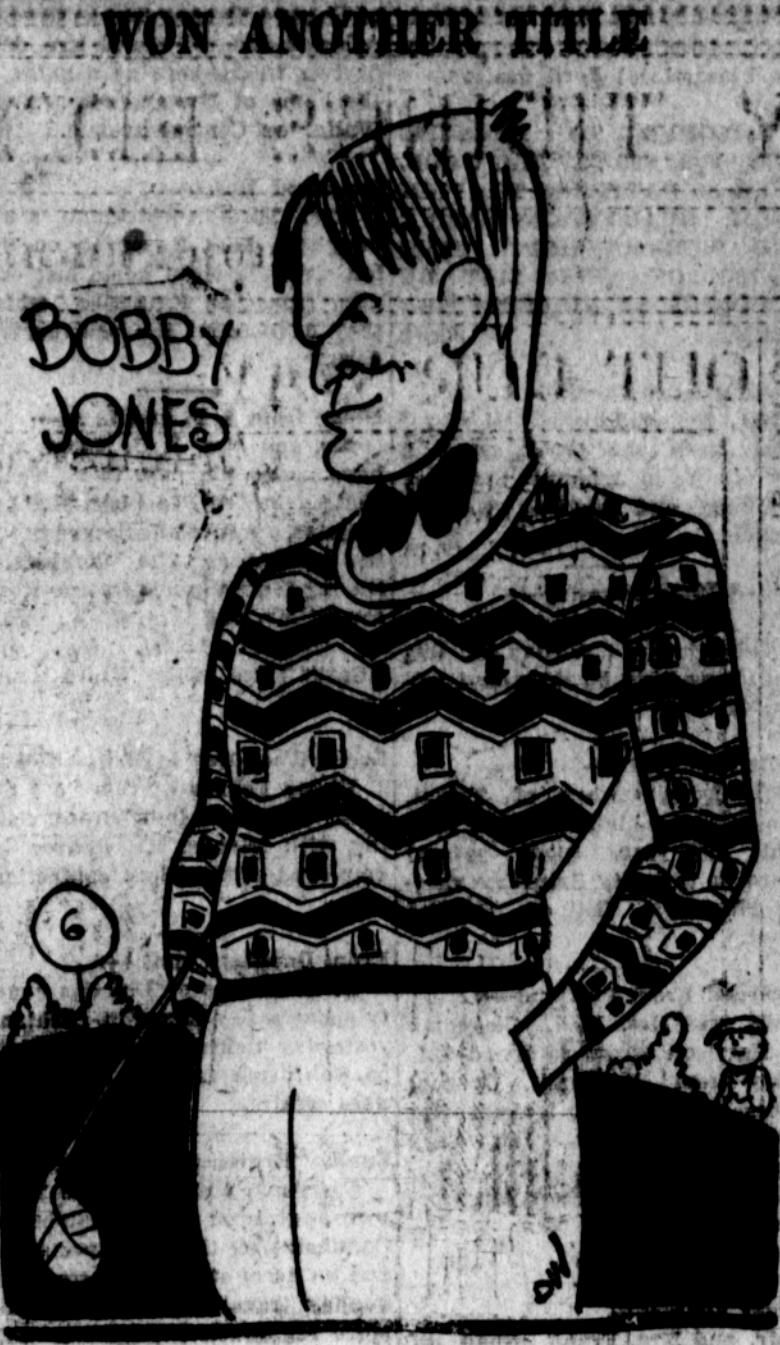

**Home Hints**  
**Cheese and Its Many Uses**  
 Cheese was once regarded as only an accompaniment to a meal or served with crackers for picnic lunches. Only within the last few years has it been discovered that cheese is such a highly nutritious food and that it can be used in many dishes either for lunch, dinner or supper.  
 Cheese is a highly concentrated food and is much better if served in combination with some other food. It is rich in protein and therefore, builds tissues and also yields heat energy to the body.  
 Being a protein food it furnishes a wide variety of dishes from which the busy housewife may choose for most substitutes.  
 You may consider cheese an expensive food, but it is not because being so concentrated only a small amount is needed in combination with milk and eggs. It has a pronounced flavor and therefore a little goes a long way.  
 Cheese is not difficult to digest providing it is properly cooked. Dishes prepared with it should be cooked at a low temperature, if cooked too rapidly it is tough and stringy.  
 There are many cheese dishes so rich in food value they take the place of meat in the diet, such as cheese fondue, soufflé, and in combination with macaroni or rice.  
 When cheese is purchased, wrap it in oil or paraffin paper and then in a damp cloth to prevent molding and from getting so hard.  
 Cheese has grown to be an everyday food, and its use is becoming more common in the average home. Not only is it good as a meat substitute, but in salads, breads, sandwiches, cookies and it always holds its place when served plain with crackers for picnic lunches.  
 It is always associated with apple pie either plain or grated and sprinkled over the crust before baking. It is delicious grated and added to the dry ingredients when making the crust for an apple pie.  
 Eat plenty of cheese but be reasonable in its use since it is a highly nutritious food.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 29.—(UP)—The gospel of "look your best," exemplified hundreds of years ago by famous women of history, is finding its way into the discussions of the National Convention of Hairdressers and Beauty Experts which met here Saturday. But, in these modern times the specialists chose to call it the "retention of pulchritudinous charms."  
 Other questions will be placed on the table before the hairdressers and beauty doctors before adjournment Thursday. There will be discussions of opening steps in asking legislatures to show proof when bans are placed on cosmetics, a polite "slap" at the barbers for their aggressions on hairdressing; and in all probability a concerted reaction against unequal regulations placed on trade members in some parts of the country.

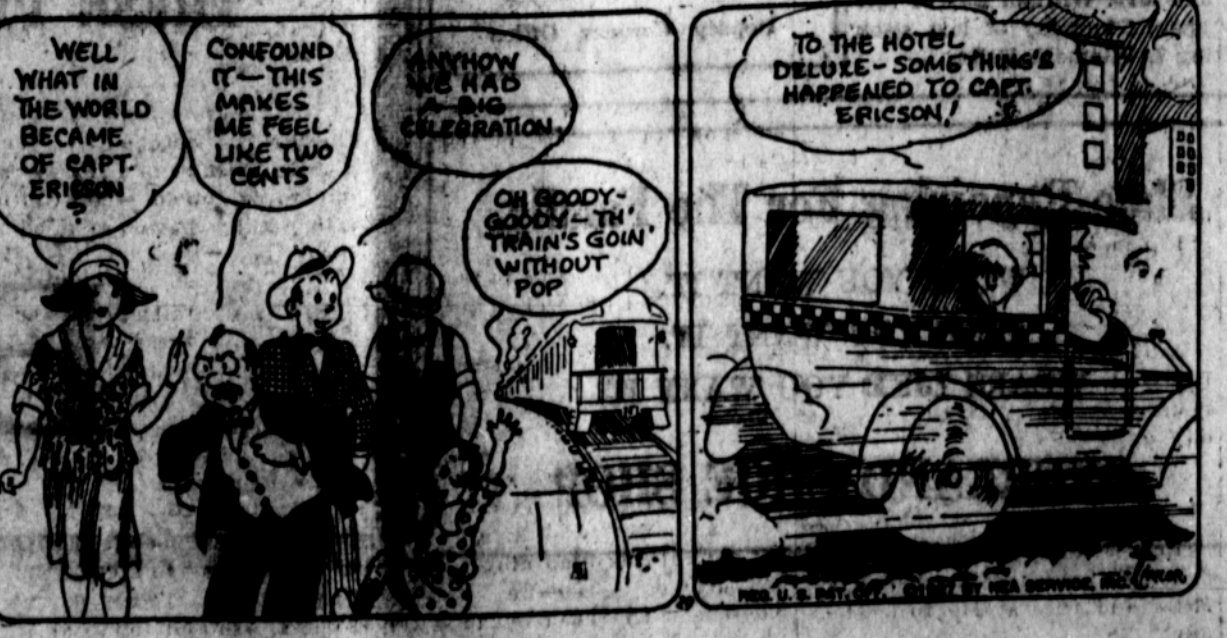
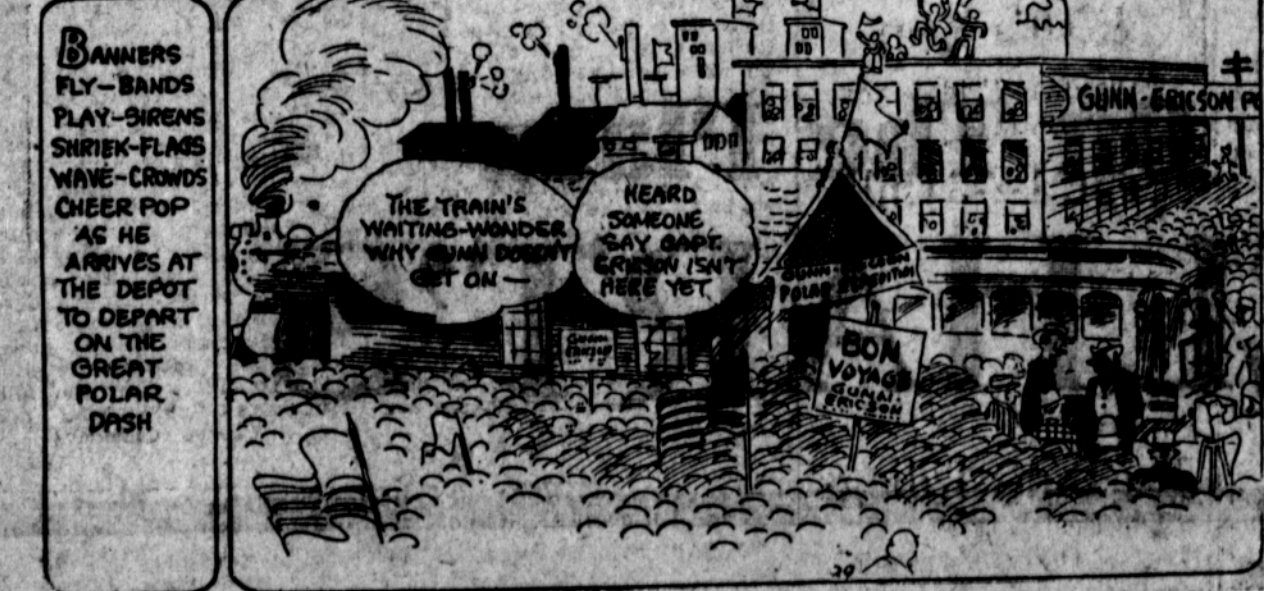
