15-ROUND BOUT BEING FAVORED

Law Provides for 10-Round Bout for Fights

CHICAGO, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Although everyone legitimately concerned favors 15 rounds as the limit of the forthcoming fight for the world's heavyweight championship, the matter is not to be settled as easily as a 11 that.

There is quite a little subtle opposition to extending the limit an additional five rounds, the present law providing only for 10-round fights. Here, as in New York, persons who have no legitimate concern with the business of fighting invariably have more to say about the sport than those closely connected with it.

And say it they do, loudly and frequently. Outsiders unwittingly provide as much ballyhoo for a big fight as folks who have a spot cash interest in it. Tex Rickard long

ago discovered the truth of that. But in this instance, those who disapprove of prize fighting—that most lucrative of sports which is bringing its incidental millions to Chicago—are blocking an effort to have the limit for the Dempsey-Tunney affair set at 15 rounds.

It would seem only common sense that if Dempsey, Tunney, Richard and the fans who are paying for the tickets all unanimously decided upon 15 rounds rather than ten, a longer fight might be arranged.

There would always be a very good chance of Mr. Tunney stopping Mr. Dempsey early in the fight, but the 15-round limit would be there in case both men kept on their feet and no protecting cups were donned.

Dempsey favors 15 rounds because he no longer is a quick starter. He is not a quick finisher, either, unless a stupid big Lithuanian opponent starts a conversation with the referee and forgets to keep on guard.

Tunney wants 15 rounds because he will have just that much more time to whip Demp-

State Experiment Station Experts Give Statement On Pressure Test For Boses

Preparing a bulletin giving results of extensive experimentation in Bosc picking, Prof. H. E. R. Hartman of the Oregon Experiment station and F. C. Reimer of the Southern Oregon Experiment Station have published the following statement of interest to fruit growers:

"These experiments have demonstrated conclusively that Bosc pears will develop high quality, good storage and keeping qualities only when picked at the proper time. The proper time to pick

depends entirely on the stage of development of the fruit. The only reliable method known for determining this is the pressure test. This method is constant and hence will prove satisfactory during any season.

"In the experimental work it has been found that the ideal time to pick Bosc pears is when the fruit tests from 25 to 27 pounds with the Oregon tester.

Every effort should be made by the grower to pick at this stage of development. Bosc pears will remain at this ideal picking stage for only one week in any one orchard, hence every effort should be made to get them off the trees during this period.
