WIDOW BRINGS SLANDER SUIT
Doctor Told Aged Husband He Was Being Poisoned, She Asserts
TRENTON, N. J., Sept. 21. (AP)—Charges that the wealthy and elderly Thompson H. McClure, late Philadelphia publisher, left home because his physician told him his young wife was slowly poisoning him here, brought out in a \$50,000 slander suit Tuesday.

Mrs. Margaret H. McClure, widow of the publisher, so testified in bringing the action in United States district court against Dr. Frank P. Moore of Trenton.

Mrs. McClure said she married McClure in 1921, when she was 28, and he 72. In a few months, a detective took her husband from their home, she said, on an assertion from Dr. Moore that she was slowly poisoning him.

As a result, Mrs. McClure said she was cut off in her husband's will except for her legal dower rights which were one-third of McClure's real property. The bulk of the estate, she said, was in personal property.

Mrs. McClure is trying to break the will in another action.

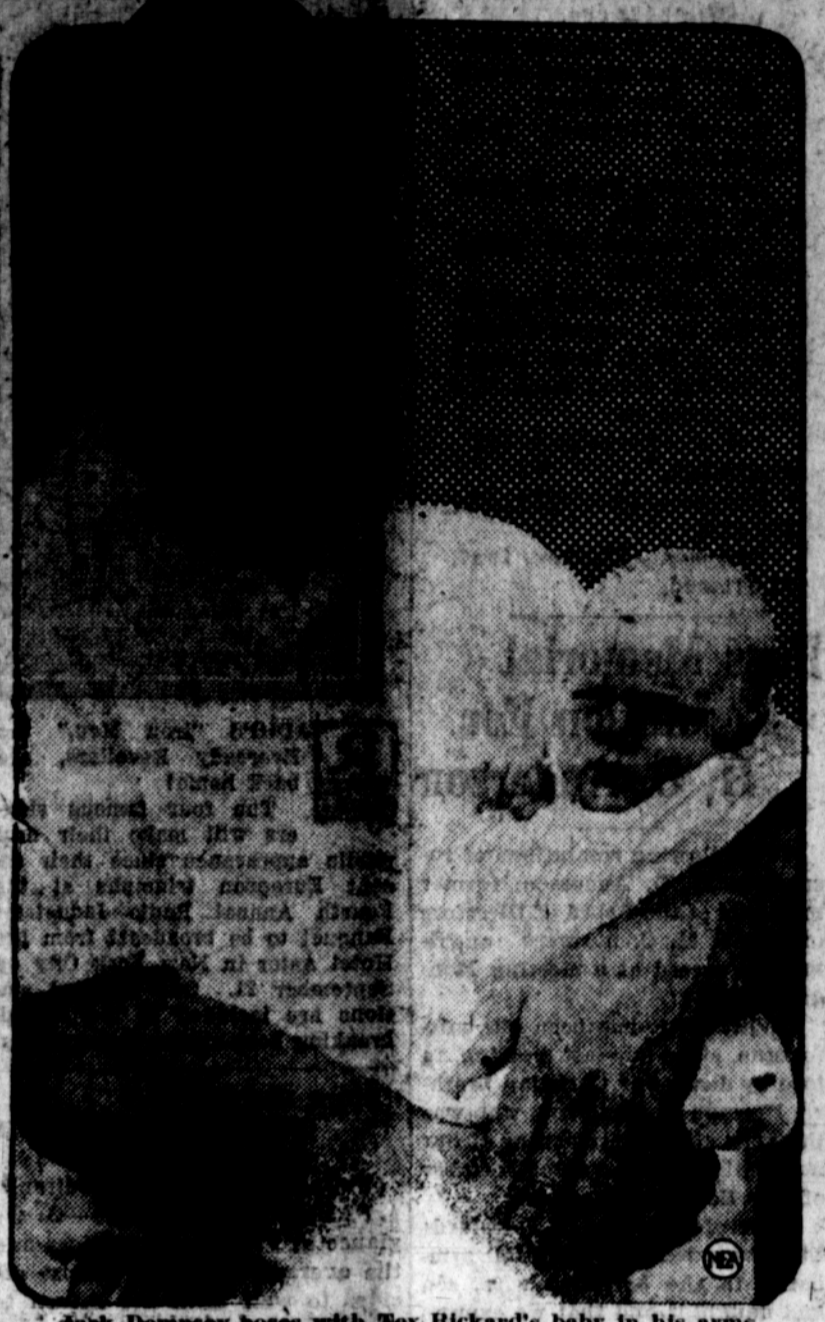

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 21.—Now, please, just reach for the rolls and olives and things if I rattle on so fast about Jack that I forget my manners, and I'll tell you everything.

So admonished the curly-headed pixie wife of the world's most famous man, with whom I dined a night or so ago. Mrs. Jack Dempsey, at least, is very sure that her husband is the outstanding man of the world.

Lots of Talking
 Over the lamb chops and spinach and bran muffins especially ordered by the nurse in constant attendance upon the fighter's wife, we talked for hours about—

Well, about the one dissension the Dempsey home knows—Estelle's refusal to spend Jack's money—

About her job in handling a sensitive husband who, as it almost believes he is "a veteran."

About how annoying it sometimes is to be the wife of so famous a man when you want to buy dollar pearl beads—

About the rumored Dempsey baby that isn't to be, and about their hurt because anyone would think they would deny the coming of the child they both hope for—

About Jack's "perfectly wonderful" way of firing the cook, and how Estelle can hardly wait to get back home and have Jack fire one she hasn't the nerve to fire herself—

About Jack's insistence that his wife be a feminine woman, and how he never wants her to smoke or drink or swear or wear her hair short—

About this thing called marriage, especially marriages of two "careerists," how it works and

all that.

This was the theme that prodded the chops and kept the iced melon and the swallow-tailed head waiter waiting long.

"Isn't it dangerous," I asked Mrs. Jack Dempsey, "to be almost as good in your own profession as your husband is in his? Aren't you poo-pooling all the 'marriage advisers' who say a husband must tower over his wife of his restlessness?"

Estelle shook her curly brown head and laid down the chop fork to seize the question with her restless analytic mind.

When Estelle Dempsey gets an idea in her head and paws and mauls it over, one understands perfectly why Jack Dempsey "listens to his wife," as some of his ring critics claim; why, moreover, he says to his carpenter, "why shouldn't I listen to Estelle? "When I was just Estelle Taylor, responsible to no one but myself, I could play any little role that gave me rent and grocery store money. Now that I'm Mrs. Jack Dempsey I can only take worth while roles. I can't have people who know Jack laughing at some scrubby little part they see me play."
