ing of children away from school. Closing of such schools may be a useful procedure as aid to effective control measures required by regulation, but there is no evidence that in cities or towns the closing of schools has any effect in stopping an epidemic. On the other hand, if a few simple procedures are adopted while the schools are kept open, an effective control of an outbreak of disease may be had.

At the beginning of an outbreak, the schools may be closed for the period of incubation and then opened, but careful guard must be exercised to discover new cases and a watch kept on the return of convalescents. The pupils should be inspected daily and those showing any signs of illness be promptly sent home. All suspicious cases should be isolated, and quarantine regulations should be strictly adhered to. If these measures are enforced the State Board of Health sees no necessity for the closing of schools in an epidemic.

low to the body. Tunney led with two lefts to the face. Dempsey warned for butting. Tunney missed a right but landed on the body. They traded lefts to the body. Gene putting three lefts and a right to the face as they clinched. Gene crossed a right to the head and shook Jack with another right. Tunney put three more rights to the jaw and Jack was wobbling as Gene put a hard left to the head driving Jack to corner. Dempsey was groggy as Gene stepped in with a left and right. Jack was hanging on the ropes at the bell. Tunney's round.

Round Five

Dempsey stepped away a d Tunney put a left to his face. Jack landed a right to his body. Gene missed a right to the head. Jack put a low left to the body but Tunney didn't complain.
