ing of children away from school. Closing of such schools may be a useful procedure as an aid to effective control measures required by regulation, but there is no evidence that in cities or towns the closing of schools has any effect in stopping an epilemic. On the other hand, if a few simple procedures are adoptwhile the schools are kept opan effective control of an

outbreak of disease may be had. At the beginning of an outbreak, the schools may be closed for the period of incubation and then opened, but careful guard must be exercised to discover new cases and a watch kept on the return of convalescents. The pupils should be inspected daily and those showing any signs of illness' be promptly sent home. All suspicious cases should be isolated, and quarantine regulations should be strictly adhered to. If these measures are enforced the State Board of Health sees no necessity for the closing of schools in an epidemic.
