BOOTLEGGER WAR IN L.A.

Bootleg King is Attacked by Two Automobile Gunmen

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 27.—(LP) —The calm which for many months has marked bootlegging activities in this city was shattered Monday by the whanging of bullets and a probably fatal bomb explosion. Tony Foster, better known as "Black Tony" Farmaglia, asserted bootleg king, was the target of two automobile gunmen who fired six shots at him as he stood beside his own car. Sam Attalio, an Italian who police records show was arrested for violation of the prohibition law last March, was probably fatally hurt when a cunningly concealed bomb, attached to the starter of his automobile, exploded. He suffered a basal skull fracture and numerous lacerations while the automobile and garage were completely destroyed. Police have been unable to question him.

The Farmaglia attack was witnessed by Policeman W. T. Robinson, who whipped out his revolver and fired four shots. He declared he heard a scream of pain from one of the fleeing gunmen. Police have ordered a round-up of bootleggers.


