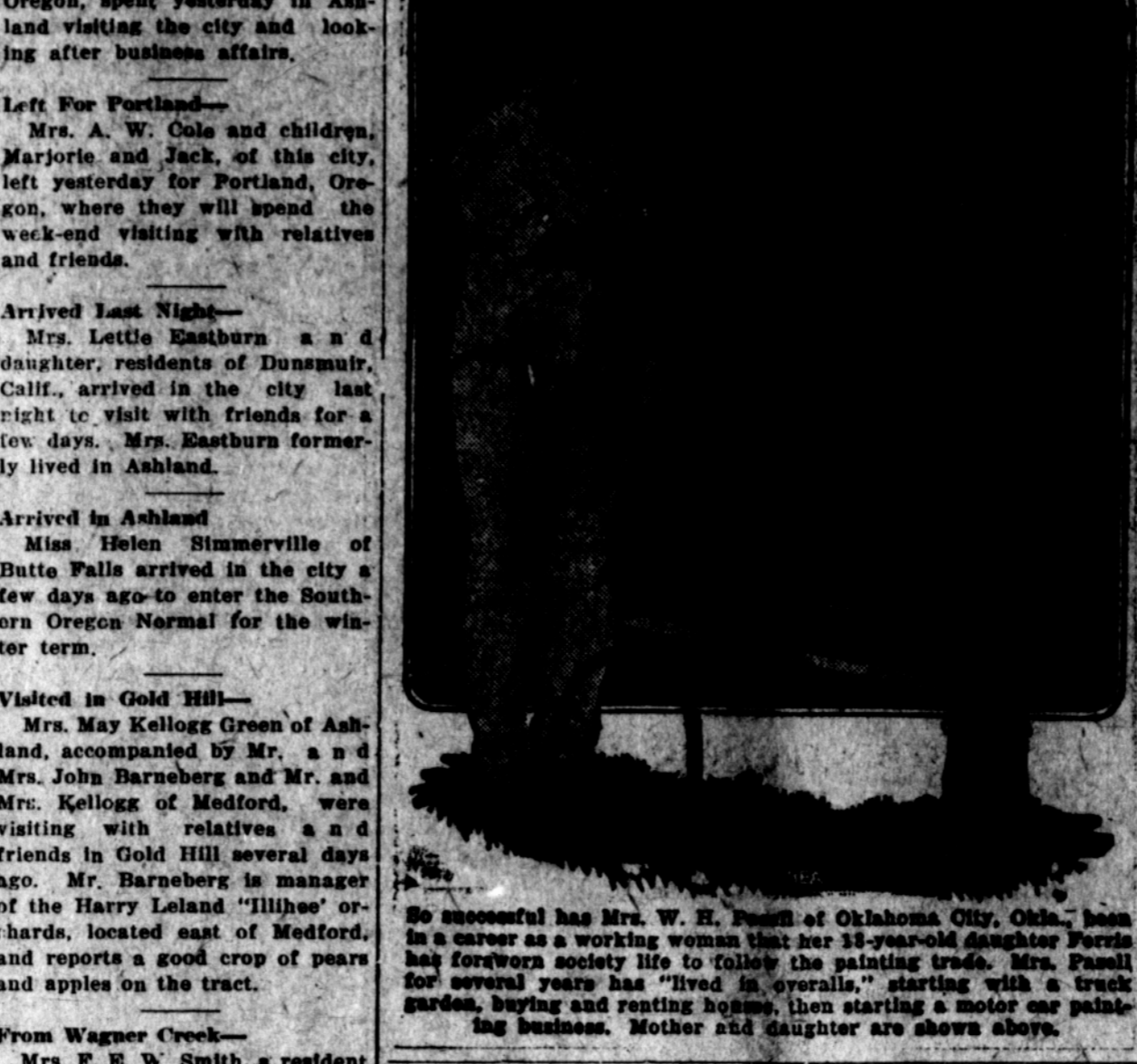


Local Personal Notes
