way admitted nor do I now admit that my office would not make a full, impartial and unprejudiced presentation of all facts relative thereto before the grand jury. However in view of the official association of said officer above set forth and the fact that this office should at all times be kept above reproach and should perform its full duty in every situation that may arise, I have, as stated, requested the appointment of a special prosecutor.

"I would urgently request that all citizens who are in possession of any information that may be of value to the grand jury in their investigation appear before that body whether they have been subpoenaed or not. Subpoenas have been issued by this office for all persons whom we have been advised know any facts relative to the occurrence under investigation."

Patterson Grants Request SALEM, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Gov. I. L. Patterson today requested Attorney General Van Winkle to take charge of the grand jury investigation in Jackson county into the killing last week of Mansford Zimmerlee who died from gunshot wounds received while attempting to escape arrest.

The attorney general has not yet decided who will represent him in the investigation but will probably send a member of his staff.

The dining cars and restaurants of the S. P. Company, the Palace, Fairmont, Whitcomb and Cliff hotels in Frisco are among the customers of the local plant. Complete equipment for the manufacturing of ice cream was installed in the plant 26 years ago and a large trade has been built up in this department.
