Former Ashland Football Star May be in College Lineup

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Oct. 6. (Special)—Frank Hall, ex-Ashland gridster, is in the list of 91 athletes turning out daily for the freshman football at the University of Oregon. He is under the ever watchful eye of William J. Reinhardt, head yearling mentor, and is showing prospects of staying throughout the season. He is being given every opportunity to display his ability.

Reinhardt has plans for two complete grid teams this fall as the Webfoot ducklings are faced with a schedule that calls for two games in as many days, one against Washington State freshmen at Pendleton, October 31 and another here the following day with Columbia university of Portland.

Arrangements for a game with the Ashland Normal school are under way, according to Jack W. Benefield, graduate manager at Oregon. The game, if scheduled, probably would be played at Ashland on November 5, if the date can be arranged.

The Webfoot freshmen schedule to date follows: October 21, Washington State freshmen at Pendleton; October 23, Columbia at Eugene; October 25, Washington freshmen at Eugene; November 5, Chemawa at Eugene; November 12, Oregon Aggie looks at Corvallis.
