LABOR PARTY IS ATTACKED

Effort Made to Oust Labor in New South Wales, Australia

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Oct. 8.—(LP)—The people of New South Wales, oldest and most developed of all the Australian States, are voting today on whether or not the Lang Labor Government shall remain in office.

There are three political parties in this state, Labor or Socialist, Nationalist (Conservative) and Country (rural). Out of ninety members of the Legislative Assembly, forty-seven were Labor, thirty-four Nationalist, and nine were members of the Country party after the last election in May, 1925, and on its slender majority over the combined strength of its two opponents,

Labor has ruled the state since. It has concentrated on industrial and humanitarian legislation, thereby strengthening its position among the workers in the cities, but weakening itself in the country centers.

The extremism of the Labor Government under Premier John T. Lang might prove its undoing at today's poll. It led to a revolt against their leader by the members of the party representing country constituencies, and this revolt in turn led to the routing of the rebels by the industrialists, who gained complete control of the party machine. Hence Labor faces the electors today a divided party. In half a dozen electorates defeated Labor rebels are opposing Labor candidates endorsed by the party machine, as well as Nationalist or Country Party candidates.

It is alleged against the Labor party that in this inter-faction fight, Premier Lang allows the party machine to be captured by unscrupulous extreme industrialists, including J. S. Garden, acknowledged leader of Australian Communists. It was against this alleged radical element that the party's rebels mainly fought—and fell. Consequently, the suspicion that Labor has taken on a red hue is almost certain to influence some of its erstwhile supporters either to vote against it, or to abstain from voting.

This question of radicalism has played an important part in the campaign of the Nationalists, and the wide influence of that party with the press of this state has raised a Bolshevik bogey similar to that dug up by the British Conservatives to oust the Ramsay MacDonald Labor Government in 1924.

Chief among the legislation enacted by Lang's Government in its two years of office were the forty-four hours' week, endowment of children, widows' pensions, and other measures improving workers' conditions. All these have imposed burdens on industries, but it has been claimed by their sponsors that they have improved industrial conditions so much that increased output by more contented workers has resulted, thus actually lowering costs of production. All the acts mentioned have proved sure vote-winners among the classes benefited but have earned the bitter opposition of employers.

Believing attack the best means of defending his industrial and humanitarian legislation, Lang throughout his election campaign has challenged Thomas Bavin, leader of the Nationalist forces,

by telling electors that the Nationalists would undo everything that the Labor Government has done for workers in the last two years.

Apart from the split in its own ranks, Labor's greatest handicap today is the united front presented by its two opposing leaders.

POTATO IS BACKGROUND ON IDAHO AUTO PLATE

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 8.—(LP)—There will be no mistaking an Idaho license plate for automobiles next year.

A Portland firm of plate makers has received an order from Idaho to make the plates. The color scheme will be potato brown and potato green and a huge "baked spud" will be the design upon which numbers and other necessary information will be worked.

Oregon, however, will stick by the plain plate, reversing the color combination of white letters and a black background for next year. Western states will stick by the new rule of spelling the name in full, which was started this year. Even the long names of "Washington" and "California" are spelled out.
