Talent, then and there being, a person over the age of 21 years and not then and there acting in self defense, on said 28th day of September, 1927, in said County of Jackson and State of Oregon, then and there being, did then and there purposely point and aim said firearm at and towards said Manford Zimmerlee and did then and there wrongfully, purposely, and feloniously and without due caution and circumspection shoot and fire said firearm pointed so as aforesaid at and towards said Manford Zimmerlee, so as to cause one of the bullets so fired by said Terry A. Talent from said firearm to strike and penetrate the body of said Manford Zimmerlee so that said Manford Zimmerlee did on the 30th day of September, 1927, in said county and state aforesaid die as a result thereof and said Terry A. Talent did so as aforesaid unlawfully, feloniously and involuntarily kill said Manford Zimmerlee by shooting him with a pistol, contrary to the statutes in such cases made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the State of Oregon.

SHORT SEASON IS SUCCESSFUL

Total of 82,354 Visitors Enter Crater Lake National Park

During the 1927 season, 82,354 visitors entered Crater Lake National park, these visitors representing every state in the Union and 11 foreign countries, according to records compiled by the National Park service.

There were 25,667 automobiles registered, of this total 8,838 entered through the Medford entrance bearing 32,847 people. The Klamath entrance was next in popularity with 7,766 cars and a total of 25,417 people. There were 1,000 cars with 3,437 visitors passed through the least entrance. The remainder of the travel checked at Anna Springs and 106 automobiles bearing 354 visitors checked at the North entrance.

The total number to visit the park was 3,665 less than in 1926, although the day-to-day travel was heavier. Due to the

late snow recession and official closing of the park the season was however, 41 days shorter than last year.

The weather at the lake is ideal at the present time but travel is not encouraged due to shutdown of hotels and camp grounds and due to the fact that storms may be expected at any time. Park activities are confined mostly to a drive to completion road and construction project before winter starts.

John Golden Has Gone Crook

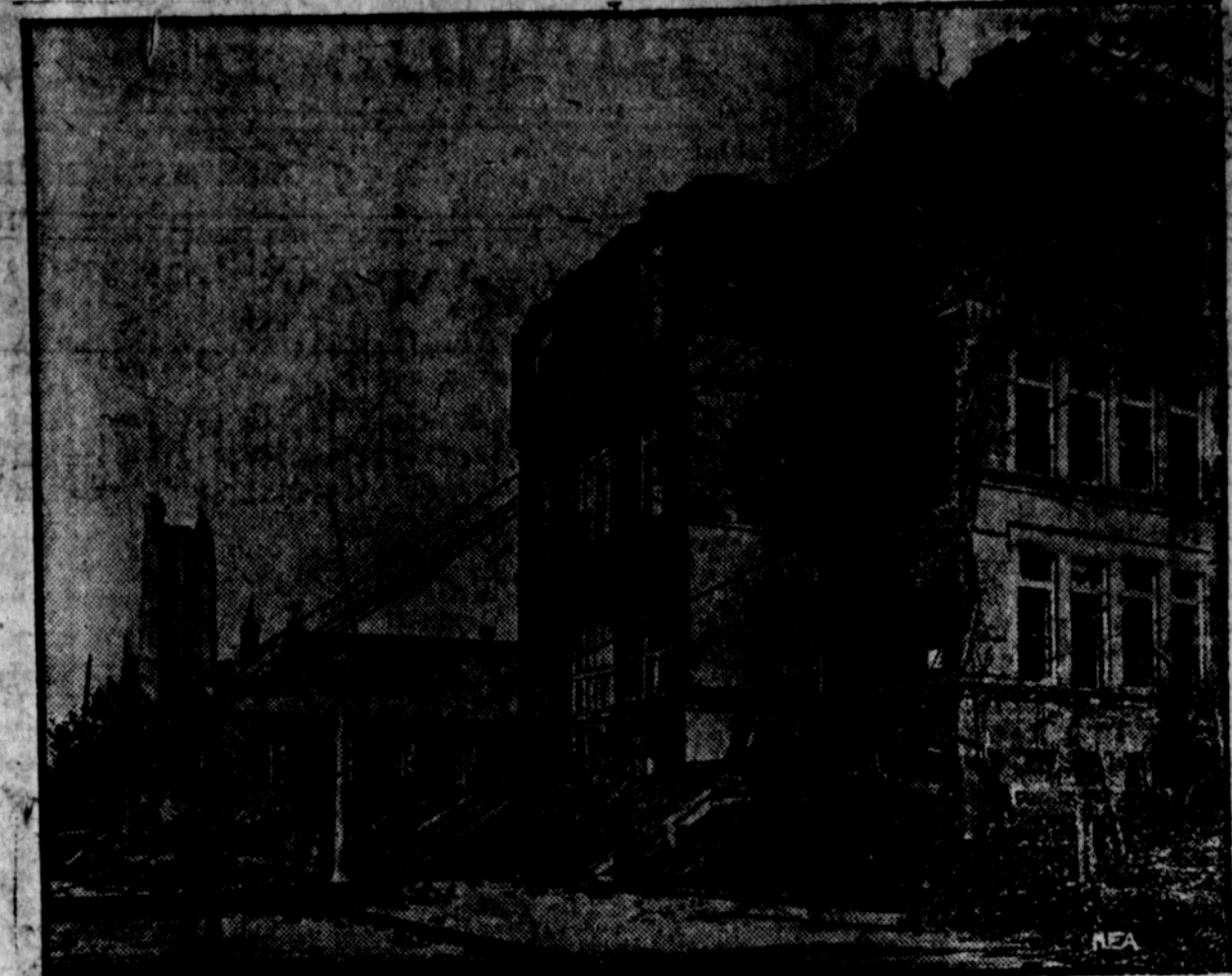

Catholic Church Not Functioning

MEXICO CITY, (UP)—The barred doors of the Cathedral of Mexico is the only sign that the Catholic Church is not functioning in Mexico. The churches, with the exception of the Cathedral, are open everywhere and at any hour dozens may be found kneeling in prayer.

The blessed sacrament is no longer kept in the churches because there are no priests but this does not prevent large numbers from continuing their devotions in the same spot where for years they knelt at daily or Sunday mass. Most of those who come to pray in the priestless houses of worship are of the poor class in whom the religious instinct dies hard.

Except for the absence of flowers and white altar cloths the churches look much the same. Candles burn before the images of the Virgin, the Sacred Heart and the saints.

Before the church doors the

beggars sit cross-legged in their accustomed places. On them seems to rest chiefly whatever burden of sorrow the change in the churches has brought. Their heads are bowed, their eyes focused on the ground. One can imagine them raising their heads only to the now unfamiliar sounds of bells in the towers above them or to the echoes of hurrying footsteps of those on their way to mass. It is these sad bundles of rags and dirt which more than anything else seem to remind one that to millions, though the doors are open, "there is no one home."
