Sinclair.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 26.—(AP)—Shot through the stomach, by a shot from his own rifle, which was apparently accidentally discharged as he pulled it after him through the brush, the body of Earl Pierce, 13-year-old Boy Scout was found in the mountains 50 miles west of here. The body of the boy was found a short distance from the place where the boy became separated from his father, Frank Pierce, last Thursday, while hunting. More than 150 searchers had combed the woods seeking the missing youth. The mother collapsed when she learned of the accident.

KILLED WHEN HE STRIKES POWER LINE

Standing on a wet board as he struck a 9,000 volt power line as the wagon on which he was riding passed beneath, Rufus Kennedy, 19, son of Sam Kennedy, Emigrant Creek, was instantly killed late yesterday afternoon. The accident occurred on a potato ranch near Klamath Falls.

His body was badly burned. His left hand was scorched and shriveled, his head showed deep burns where he struck against the wire as he fell. His body was covered with burns as the current passed through his body.

ONE NEW CASE OF PARALYSIS

State Report Shows Jackson County Practically Free of Disease

Thirty-one cases of infantile paralysis developed in Oregon during the week ending October 22, according to a report filed by the state health department. Only one new case of the disease was reported in Jackson county. Eight cases were reported from Coos county and five from Josephine county, the report indicated. Two new cases were reported from Klamath county.

Of the 23 cases of typhoid fever in the state, 18 last week developed in Jackson county. Five cases of diphtheria were also reported. No other contagious diseases were placed under quarantine last week.
