Heifetz, Master Violinist, Returned to America

After two years spent in thrilling thousands of persons in other parts of the world, Heifetz, famous Russian violinist, returns to America this season to make his greatest tour—a journey extending from coast to coast, from Canada on the north to Mexico and Cuba on the south. Heifetz will play at the public auditorium in Portland, November 14, direction Steers & Johnson.

Heifetz is today a mature artist, whose place among the truly great is firmly established. During his two years abroad he has added triumphs to an already notable list, again winning the unstinted praise of London, Paris, Berlin, Vienna, Petrograd, and in the great provincial cities of Scandinavia and Australia. During the past 18 months Heifetz has concertized in 16 countries and his return to America this season makes his fifth journey across the Pacific.

The name of Jascha Heifetz has been before the American public for so long that it seems hardly credible that this really great violinist is only 26. When he made his American debut ten years ago he was looked upon as a boy prodigy. Yet even then, at 16 years, he was a seasoned and mature artist, with seven concert seasons behind him.

Heifetz's first public appearance was made at the age of five years, but it was not until he was nine that he gave his first public recital in Petrograd. Soon after this he was soloist, with the orchestra at Pavlovsky, playing before an audience of 5000. By the time he was ten he had mastered violin repertoire.

Heifetz cannot be judged by common standards of excellence, for he himself has established new ones, not only for himself but for all others who play or will play the violin. With him, when he plays, the technique of his instrument seems to have disappeared completely, to such a degree is his art established. Only a skilled violinist will marvel at the consummate ease with which he masters the most complex problems of violin technique. All others hear only the suave, rich

and generous tone that flows unceasingly from the instrument, the purity of the line, the nobility and beauty of the interpretation and, above all, will wonder admiringly at the complete simplicity and unaffectedness of the performer.

Hard Time "Mixer" At Normal

The annual hard time "Mixer" party was held last evening, Monday, October 31, in the auditorium of the Southern Oregon Normal school, at which all of the instructors and their wives, students and the teachers of the training school were present. Rally Day Service Splendid

The Rally Day services, held Sunday morning, October 30, at the Baptist church in this city, were a splendid success. The church parlors were beautifully decorated for the affair with evergreen, wild berries, autumn leaves and fall flowers. A large motto "Rally Day" made of brightly colored autumn leaves on a white background was placed across the altar.

Eight or ten little children, between the ages of three and five, gave readings, after which several of the older Sunday school members gave a number of dialogues. Mrs. Bert Hinthorne's class presented a clever exercise, each person saying a verse that corresponded with the letters in "Rally Day."

Dr. DeWalt Norton gave a fine talk to the boys and to the girls and told a touching story of a girl who was crippled during childhood and remained uncured throughout her lifetime. Dr. Norton also told of Fannie Crosby, the blind hymn writer, visiting this woman. He is acquainted with Miss Crosby and at one time was associated with her in his work.
