Plea for Membership in Jackson County Game Protective Work is Made by Members of Directorate

When we consider that the wild life of Oregon, its game and game fish resources, is one of our most valuable assets, it is rather disturbing to find such a lamentable lack of interest among the people generally as to how this wild life is being conserved, propagated and protected. And more disturbing still is the lack of active interest displayed by many sportsmen in this important question of game conservation. The only seeming interest many of them display is making the bag limit as many times as they lawfully can during the open seasons. It is safe to say that if game laws were repealed and all birds let down, that within a period of less than ten years the game birds, game animals, and most of the game fish of the state would become extinct. This being the situation, it behooves every citizen of the state to give active support to the state game commission and to its local game organization. You will understand how necessary this is when you consider that the only revenues available for this great work are derived from voluntary license buying, fines, trapping permits, etc. That not one cent comes from state or county revenues, or out of the pockets of the general tax paying public. The revenues of the game commission amounts to around \$350,000 to \$400,000 per year.

The commission now operates three game farms for the propagation and distribution of game birds—China Pheasants, Hungarian Partridges, wild turkeys, etc. It owns and operates about 25 fish hatcheries, with a large number of egg taking stations. It keeps in the field an active and efficient warden and patrol service and carries on publicity and educational work with the limited funds made available for that purpose. And remember, title to all the real estate and other property being accumulated by the commission is vested in the state for the benefit of all the people when only a small proportion of the people of the state contribute to the fund out of which these large expenditures are met.

In the last two years there have been released in the streams of Jackson county by the state game commission: 2,000,000 steelhead; 225,000 silverides; 145,000 eastern brook; 18,000 black bass, perch and crappies; 12,000 cat fish.

To this distribution should be added 35,000 steelheads released in the Applegate by the U. S. Bureau of Hatcheries.

Game birds released in Jackson county during the same period: 1,000 China pheasants; 72 Hungarian partridges; 68 wild turkeys.

Instead of releasing very small fry from the state hatcheries as has been the custom in the past, the young fish are now being held until they are five to six inches in length. While this entails a much larger expense in carrying charges, the practical results are much more satisfactory.

The commission plans to double the present capacity of the Butte Falls hatchery. This work is already under way, and means a large increase in steelheads hatched exclusively for stocking the Rogue river.

It has been almost two years since the Jackson County Game Protective Association has held an annual meeting and banquet. Our only source of revenue is the collection of one dollar yearly dues. This has not been collected for two years. The treasury of the association has been empty for some time, and such expenses as taking care of consignments of game birds and fish, our dues to the State organization, and expenses of a delegate to the State

convention, advertising in the Oregon Sportsman, and fighting the passage of the tithing bill in the last legislature has been met out of the pockets of the officers of the association.

Next February or March we will hold our regular annual banquet and meeting for the election of officers, at which time dues for 1928 will be paid. In the meantime, we need money to pay our outstanding indebtedness and to carry on the important work for which the association is organized.

We are going to ask every man in Jackson County who believes in conserving this great natural resource, and who derives pleasure or profit from the wild life in our forests and streams, to send one dollar for his 1928 dues to Mr. Chris Gottle by the Chamber of Commerce, Medford, or to Louis Dodge, secretary of the association, at Ashland.

Book Review

The Book of the Month—"Giants In The Earth" by O. E. Rolvaag.

It is a paradox that the first great American novel of the land has been translated into English for its main body of readers. The book is "Giants In The Earth", and its author is a professor named Rolvaag who first wrote it in Norwegian. The story of the American Northwest. It is a simple tale, boldly pushed on, relying for dramatic intensity upon the inevitable conflict between a lonely farm wife's desires and a husky husbandman's dreams. "Giants In The Earth" seems to achieve the same great intensity and breadth of Knut Hamsun's own work. It is no cheap epithet to call Rolvaag an American Hamsun.

We have all suffered over novels of Northwestern farmers. They have been, as a rule, dry as dust, boring and dreadful. Occasionally, as in the case of Prairie by Mr. Muhlenberg and in Miss Suckow's work, a certain integrity of style has made up for utter monotony of material. But Rolvaag has a comic gusto and an epic force back of him that lifts his work into greatness.

The story "Giants In The Earth" is a simple one. Per Hansa, farmer from Norway, brings his wife and his children and chatels out of civilization and into the great reaches of the Northwest. In company with others of his race he stakes out a quarter section of land and begins cultivation. What befalls is more or less in line with the accepted hardships of pioneers. There are famine and cold, superstition and ignorance. By the time the tale is done, a great section of prairie has become a new granary of mankind.

The incidents in "Giants In The Earth" are seldom dramatic. Perhaps the chief zest of the book is the gusto that pervades its writing. Rolvaag knows his Norsemen and he feels their immensities of spirit, their great appetites for land, for food, for children. There is poetry in the comic zest of Per Hansa and his mates. There is comedy in their relationships. There is epic force in their work

Helps for the Handy Man

Useful things that can be made at home

An Easy-to-Make, Movable Work Bench That Should Be in Every Home

A Serviceable, Inexpensive Work Bench That Is a Joy to Build and Use

The success and satisfaction that come from the home workshop depend not only on good tools, but on having a convenient and enjoyable place to use them. Naturally, your first need is for a good, substantial work bench.

A bench which provides a smooth top to work upon, with a vise at one end and at least one drawer in which smaller articles can be kept, should fit the needs of the average home shop owner. With your experience in wood-working that comes with the use of tools, you can later build and install wall cabinets or cupboards for other tools and equipment, if they are needed, but just now, let us consider the type of bench to build.

The accompanying illustrations show a picture of a finished bench and also the necessary working drawings of a bench with a broad top, two drawers at the right end, and an adjustable vise. The frame is of two-inch material and the joints are not nailed, but, as shown in the drawing, are fastened with bolts in such a way that you can take this bench apart in a few minutes and pack it into a small space. This feature makes it possible to move the bench easily.

All of the details are so arranged that you need not have special tools to do any of the work.
