The revenues of the game commission amounts to around \$350,000 to \$400,000 per year. The commission now operates three game farms for the propa- gation and distribution of game birds.—China Pheasants, Hungar- ian Partridges, wild turkeys, etc. It owns and operates about .25 fish hatcheries, with a large num- ber of erg taking stations. 
