Serious Accident Narrowly Averted

Guard rails prevented a serious accident on the Grater Lake highway recently when they prevented a large car from plunging over the embankment into the roaring depths of the Rogue River 300 feet below. The near accident occurred near the spot where in 1924 a touring car with eight passengers plunged off the highway. All were killed. The guard rail was constructed shortly after this tragedy occurred.

Timber Losses Low This Year

Only 2,300 acres of timber and brush land were burned in Jackson county in 1927 compared with 70,598 acres burned off in 1926, according to records of the forestry department. Combined fire fighting expenses in 1927 amounted to but \$859 compared with \$14,988 in 1926.

After fifteen years of toil, a synthetic gasoline, the invention of Dr. Friedrich Bergius, has been placed on the market in Germany. The introduction of the product in this country is not expected for some time. At the present time chemists are at work on the process which may greatly reduce the price of gasoline.

Tests by the bureau of mines show that fat men can stand high temperatures better than thin ones. They lost more weight but were less exhausted after the experiments were over. The trials revealed that high pulse rate rather than the mere increase in body temperature, is the important factor that brings discomfort under high heat and humidity.
