McNeal Gives Interesting Data on Pirate-Sons Game Tomorrow

Coach Mac McNeal allowed a slight smile to light up his face last night as he kept his men through their last heavy workout in preparation for the game Saturday. After the workout he pronounced his men in good condition for the Pirates.

Last night's work consisted largely of signal practice and kicking. Some time was spent in perfecting passes and end runs which will undoubtedly be used as the major attack in the game Saturday. Forward pass defense came in for attention also and the backs were intercepting and knocking down passes all over the field. The coach seemed well satisfied with the squad, although he made no statement as to his opinion on the outcome of the first intercollegiate game to be played in Southern Oregon.

Last night's first string lineup contained the following: Center, Hobson; left guard Johnson; left tackle Rice; left end May; right guard Ball; right tackle Heffner; right end Shields; left half Spears; full Mercer; right half Prouse; quarter Gosnell. Shields was calling signals and directing the team on the field last night and was appointed acting captain by the coach for the coming game. It is thought the above lineup will be on the field when the kickoff takes place Saturday afternoon.

DEATH TOLL REACHES 60

Twenty-One Bodies Are Recovered by Divers in Harbor

SYDNEY, Australia, Nov. 4.—Bodies of 21 of the victims of the ferryboat "Graycliffe" which was rammed and sunk in the harbor here yesterday by the steamer Tahiti have been recovered.

Divers reported that at least 40 bodies are still in the vessel's saloons. If reports are correct death toll has mounted to at least 61.

Jay Johnson is a versatile star able to play on either line or in the backfield and is a real asset to the team. With an ability to kick, pass and carry the ball equally well, Chuck Prouse, who starred the South Pasadena High School equal, will be in the limelight. Shorty Gosnell who

did some fine work on the Ashland high squad is doing good work on the backfield position.

"Blond" Heffner, who figures the scales at 260 pounds, a Pasadena youth, tackles with a deadly result. Kenneth Hobson, a pure green material is showing up remarkably well in center position. Harry May has displayed offensive and defensive ability at end. Rice, ex-Jacksonville star, plays the position of tackle. Homer Dickson from Dunsmuir, al-

SPORTSMATTER

It becomes increasingly evident that much of the football class of 1927 is concentrated in the middle west.

Offhand it might be said that this section leads all others in the possession of promising and score-producing gridiron material.

Chet Smith, who writes authoritatively and entertainingly of "Big Ten" football affairs, has this to say of the midwestern situation:

"The best backfield in the Western Conference is at Northwestern. It is about the nearest thing to the 'Four Horsemen' I have seen and for sheer power I think it is better.

"The players are Yatz Levison, quarter; George Holmer and Captain Vic Gustafson, halfbacks; Tiny Lewis, fullback.

"Lewis, 190 pounds, is a line plunger, fast in an open field and averaged 60 yards against Ohio State in his punting. Levison, 178, is the lightest. Gustafson and Holmer weigh around 180.

"Every one of them can run, pass, kick, and do it better than the average back. They will bear watching.

"Ohio has Art Huston, a sophomore, who is a beautiful runner and passer, Elmer Marek and Byron Eby are other good halves. Aside from them, Ohio's backfield material is mediocre.

"Michigan has Louie Gilbert, halfback, and a good one. Herb Joesting, of course, is Minnesota's strong back. Jud Timm is playing well for Illinois. Chester Wilcox and Ralph Welch are best for Purdue, but the former was hurt and may be out of Saturday's game.

"Chicago has no outstanding back, but has four or five who are steady and dependable, which accounts for the team's early season success. Toad Crofoot is a triple threat man at Wisconsin. Others probably will be heard from later and I will let you know about them.

"As to ends, Bennie Oosterbaan of Michigan, of course, is the best so far. In addition to being the best pass receiver, he has been developed into a passer and is doing well at it. In addition, he's a peach on the defense, big enough to break down most anything that comes his way.

"Fisher of Northwestern is another good end, but wingmen are somewhat scarce out here so far.

"Leo Raskowski of Ohio State is perhaps the best tackle in the Conference. He is a junior, weighs 220 pounds, stands about 6 ft. 3, and is a bear for work. Emerson Nelson, Iowa captain and All-America on some selections last fall, is handicapped by a weak team, but he's plenty good. Sinkler, Northwestern, shows promise as does Harrigan of Michigan.

"Baer of Michigan is a good guard and Dart of Northwestern is a wow.

"Van Brangen of Wisconsin will be worth watching. "Bob Reitsch, Illinois captain, is THE center. Others may develop."

The outstanding back of the East is Bruce Caldwell of Yale. After Caldwell comes the deluge, the choice of partisans, critics and fanatics, the halfbacks and fullbacks of everyman's team.

The young man from Yale stands head and shoulders above them all.

If you can buck the line, skirt tackle, run the ends, fling long, accurate passes, kick goals from 50 yards away, get off your punts of 60 and 70 yards through a charging wave of opposing forwards and do most of the tackling for your team's secondary defense—then you're a Bruce Caldwell.
