COAL STRIKE ARBITRATION IS EFFECTED

Miners Asked to Return to Work While Demands Are Investigated

DENVER, Nov. 23.—(AP)—The first definite step toward peace in the Colorado coal fields came today when 20 northern Colorado coal operators agreed to accept arbitration of strike by the state industrial commission. The operators announced the individual employers would invite the men to return to work in the meantime that the industrial body might make a thorough investigation of the wage demands of the miners and all issues bearing on the strike.
